GENERAL ELECTIONS.

The election of members for the House of Commons took place on Tuesday last, and resulted in returning Sir John A. Macdonald and his party to power. Contrary to the expectations of a great many the Conservatives rolled up a heavy majority in the House, but not so large as that in 1873. In 1873 the two parties stood, Reformers 50, Conservatives 146, being a majority of 86 for the Ministerial party.

The latest returns gave the Opposition 40, and the Ministerialists 50 members in Ontario, leaving Algoma and North Victoria to hear from. In Quebec the Opposition carried 13, and the Government 50, with two seats yet to be heard from. Nova Scotia returned 7 Oppositionists and 14 Ministerialists. New Brunswick gave eight seats to each party, allowing the Government to count Prof. Foster and Hon. P. Mitchell, who were elected as Independents, among their supporters. While Prince Edward Island gave a large Reform gain, the Government securing only two seats out of six; a Reform gain of three seats. Dividing the two constituencies in Ontario yet to be heard from, giving one to each party the total number of seats held by the Opposition, is 72 against 127 by the Government, or a majority in favour of the Ministry of 54. The indications are that the Government majority in a full House will not exceed 60.

I. Haldimand County D. Thompson, Esq., defeated Mr. Merritt by 150 majority, and in North Norfolk Charlton was returned by a large majority, while in South Norfolk Jackson, the Reform candidate, defeated Wallace by 51 of a majority, as near as we can learn.

Who Was Right?

To the Editor of the JARVIS RECORD:

DEAR SIR—In contradiction of a statement made by John McLain Esq., of Walpole, Mr. P. Kinney, harness maker of Nanticoke, was understood most emphatically to say that he had not previously sold 70 solid team harnesses for \$24 per set, that he had sold them as cheaply, and that he had made no addition in his prices since the introduction of the National Policy. Now, if prior to '79, Mr. Kinney did sell, as he affirms, at as low figures as other dealers, then it is not difficult to determine whether he sold at \$24. M. C. Brown, Esq., Simcoe, having been consulted relative to prices and the N. P., says that he bought saddlery hardware of a Buffalo firm for about four years before that policy was established and since then continuously up to the present time. His invoices show that since the N. P. humbug became a reality there has been a very marked rise in the price of goods he imports. He further adds that he has received no rebate from the American dealers, in consequence of the increased duties, while, therefore he did sell good long leg team harness prior to '79 for \$24 he has since that time been unable to sell an equally good article for the same money, but has been obliged to charge to his customers whatever the N. P. has increased the cost of manufacture to himself—by no means an insignificant sum. Mr. Newell, Pt. Dover, makes virtually the same statement respecting the tariff and present prices. And so taking it for granted that Mr. Kinney told the truth when he said that previous to '79 he sold harness at as low rates as other dealers it follows that in many instances, at least, his prices could not have exceeded \$24, though he so distinctly affirmed that his figures were then and are now \$30 for such harness as above specified. It is now easy to judge whether Mr. Kinney or Mr. McLain was right concerning the subject of the N. P., and also, of the two, who had the more faulty memory. It may be added that in either Dover or Simcoe good team harness can be bought at considerable less than \$30.
