## WALPOLE COUNCIL.

June 9th, 1884.

The Council met pursuant to adjournment, with the members all present.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Richard Lishman being sworn proved claim for two-thirds damages for five sheep damaged by dogs.—Carried.

Jacob Robins being sworn proved claim for two-thirds damages for two sheep killed and three worried by dogs.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Holbrook, that the Council grant the sum of twenty dollars to be expended on townline between Oneida and Walpole, Road Division No. 100, and that Robert Erwin expend the same, Oneida having granted a like sum.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Jepson, seconded by Walker, that James Hewitt be appointed to expend the sum granted to repair townline north of Road Division No. 101, by Walpole and Oneida.—Carried.

The Council the formed themselves into a Court of Revision to revise the Assessment Roll for the current year, with Mr. Jones in the chair. After making a number of necessary changes in the Assessment it was moved by Mr. Walbrook, seconded by Mr. Holbrook that the Court of Revision do no adjourn to meet again on Wednesday, the 48th inst., and that the Council resume ordinary business, and that the Reeve take the chair.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Walker, seconded by Mr. Jones, that Mr. Jepson be appointed commissioner to repair bridge on 1st Concession, opposite Lot 17.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Jepson, seconded by Mr. Holbrook, that Mr. Walker be appointed a commissioner to rebuild a culvert on townline between Walpole and Woodhouse, in conjunction with a commissioner appointed by Woodhouse Council.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Walker, seconded by Mr. Holbrook, that Mr. Jones be appointed a commissioner to rebuild a bridge on 5th Concession, near Mr. Booths.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Walker, seconded by Mr. Holbrook, that the Reeve be appointed to examine Bridge on Sixth

Concession, opposite Lot 21, and repair if necessary.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Holbrook, seconded by Mr. Walker, that the Clerk be requested to write to Asa Kindra and George Thompson, to remove their fence off the road, allowance on the side road, which they have lately placed thereon, or legal action be taken at once.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Jepson, that the Reeve with Mr. Holbrook, be appointed commissioners to repair 15th Concession, road opposite Lots 4 and 5.—Carried.

Henry Ivey Esq., of Jarvis, gave a statement of the expenditure of moneys, granted last year for grading the Mainstreet in Jarvis, showing a small balance of \$5.53 on hand. He also presented a petition from the rate payers of Jarvis, applying for a further grant for the same purpose.

Moved by Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Holbrook, that a bill be introduced and read a first time, for the purpose of regulating and licensing Transient Traders, whose names are not entered on the assessment roll.—Bill read a first time.

Moved by Mr. Jepson, seconded by Mr. Walker that the Bill be read a second time. Bill read a second time.

Moved by Mr. Holbrook, seconded by Mr. Walker, that the bill be read a third time, be passed, signed and entitled as in the original motion.

Bill read a third time. Passed, signed, and entitled accordingly.

Moved by Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Holbrook, that a Bill be introduced and read a first time, for the purpose of appointing an Inspector to carry out the Act with respect to worms, weeds and diseases affacing fruit trees.—Bill read a first time.

Moved by Mr. Walker, seconded by Mr. Jepson, that the second reading of the Bill, be deferred till the next meeting of this Council.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Holbrook, seconded by Mr. Jones, that the Reeve be authorized to issue his cheques to pay the following sums.
