To Editor of Record:

SIR.—You readers cannot fail to have noticed the difference between the tone of Mr. Bourne's letter and that of Tory Treasurers in your last issue.

In the matter of this change in the township Officers Mr. Bourne's conduct has been dignified and correct.

Mr. Bourne having sent in a "declared list," this denial I must accept, at the same time explain further the circumstances of Mr. Snider's statement to me. When at the preliminary revision of the Dominion Voters' List at Cayuga, in April 1886, I met Mr. Snider on the street crossing near Mason's Hotel. I asked him how he came to declare to those lists he had handed in? He replied he had not declared on any list, the lists were sent to him as President of the Conservative Association, and in that capacity he considered it his duty to hand them in. I asked "how could you as a professional man, knowing that no man can declare to the qualification of a number of other hand in such lists?" He replied "he did not hand them in as a professional man but as President of the Conservative Association. Those lists" he added "were prepared by responsible men in their several localities throughout the County, and are I think correct for instance Mr. Bourne the Township Clerk of Walpole, Mr. Ineson, late Deputy Reeve and others, all responsible men furnished these lists."

Mr. Bourne defies me to show that there were more errors against the Reformers than the Conservatives in the 1886 list. At the Court of Revision I lent my copy of the Conservative appeals to Tory Treasurer "as he had come to the court without a copy, and I do not now find it with my copy of the Reform Appeals. If Mr. Bourne can furnish me with a copy of the Conservative appeals, I will accept his challenge and undertake to prove what he requires.

In the mean time I would be glad to hear Mr. Bourne's explanation of the following matters. I have noted on my appeals that Lafayette Dennis was added to the List; but in the list approved by the Judge and in the Schedule attached; in which are set forth the changes made, and which were prepared by Mr. Snider, this name is left out. I have no special recollection of this man's case. But in the case of William Wright who was ordered to be put on but has been left off. I remember that in the first place he failed in proving sufficient income, but as he left the court I was informed he had money out at interest, and at once sent for him back. I then asked the Judge to hear his further evidence. The Judge consented, but said it was not to be considered a precedent. On hearing the further evidence of Mr. Wright the Judge ordered the name to be added; but I find it has not been added.

An appeal was made to put Wm. Hawthorne off the list. He was one of those who were unlawfully put on the Assessment Roll without an appeal and without evidence by the Township Council at the Revision of the Roll, and his evidence in chief went to show that he had been at home several months sick, and that during the few months he had worked he had not earned sufficient to qualify. Those who were present in the court must remember how Tory Treasurer in his cross examination endeavoured to get that young man to swear that while at home sick, it was an understanding between him and his mother that he received his board as an equivalent for doing a few chores for her. It requiring the value of the board to complete the qualification.

The way that Tory Treasurer twisted the matter about, and again and again, with the most overbearing and insistent manner presented the lie, for that young man to swear to was most painful. I sat and speculated as to whether the snorter catchism, or that Tory Treasurer's mendacity would prevail, but early training won and the young man every time refused to swear to the lie.

A further question or two satisfied the Judge and he ordered the name to be struck off.—Yet this name has not been struck off.—It is now in order for Mr. Bourne to explain, and if I get a copy of the Conservative appeals I will, I think prove all he asks. At the Municipal Nomination Mr. Bourne was annoyed at my mentioning the amount expended on the Revision. Now I see a charge of \$73.51 against his name in the accounts first printed for 1887, as expenses, Court of Revision; also \$3, as expenses, Court of Revision; and twenty cents for each name appealed, is twelve cents and three dollars for attending the court. 120 appeals at 12 cents is \$14.40, and \$3 for attending makes \$17.40, the reasonable expenses for serving the notices could not possibly be over \$15, altogether \$32.40. If I am wrong will Mr. Bourne please correct me by furnishing the items of this expenditure, and quote his authority also quote the section of the Act that allows \$3 to the Assessor?

Tory Treasurer in his letter says "if I had been at the last meeting of the County Council I would not reiterate my statement on the York bridge and free toll charges and that Mr. Murray, Reeve of Oneida, declared Mr. Holmes' motion to rescind the motion of last June to be childish."

This is the first attempt in all this correspondence that Tory Treasurer or Ex-Officer has attempted to introduce a subject And now observe the total want of point or reason in it. It was the township of Oneida and Seneca that took action against this County Council to compel the building of the York bridge. Is it any wonder then that the Reeve of Oneida opposed any motion tending to reduce the chances of their getting that bridge, nor would the Deputy Reeve nor the Reeves of Seneca coincide with Mr. Holmes' motion. Our Walpole Reeve introduced the motion of June last as is supposed to influence the vote in case the protest led to another election. The Reform Reeves may have voted against that, but now the motion is on the record they will doubtless let it stay there where the municipalities they represent are in accord, but

this is not the case in Walpole. The rate-payers have always opposed it and the Reeves have advanced the views of their constituents until last year, when our Reeves went round and supported this immense expenditure.

His second attempt to launch out for himself, is that the change in the law compelling County Councils to assume the Roads and bridges on the town lines is statutory and was passed by the Moral Government. Of course it would be statutory to quote such a change in the law. Section 532 to 537 of the Municipal Act 1883 are entirely permissive and Section 543 of the Revised Statutes is still the same, a proof copy of which lay beside me. The effect if the change is to change the town lines on the equalized assessment, whereas before this Rainham had twice our length of town line in proportion to acreage, Seneca, North Cayuga and South Cayuga one and a half times, Sherbrooke four times and Canboro more than twice. All the Townships except Rainham are valued lower than Walpole in the equalization so that our Reeves last year more than doubled our expenditure on the town lines and this either from sheer ignorance or worse.

Perhaps the further explanation in regard to the conversation I had with Mr. Snider may freshen his memory, but can anything justify the assumption that because Mr. Snider did not remember, I necessarily had made a false statement. This Tory Treasurer and Ex-Officer has during this correspondence conclusively proven that he has no truth in him, and necessarily he cannot understand the possession of it by any one else. His statements like those of a Charlatan are always unaccompanied by proof. His rebid treatment of a grave subject will not have commanded him to the intelligent reader, his egotism in vaunting his successful writing can have produced nothing but contempt. His classic expression that I am covered down from his prods is the language of the auditor rather than of the schools. While his elevation at retaining the Treasuryship is in keeping with his untruthfulness in this correspondence. As at the first meeting of Council he was indignant with me, when I said if his appointment was extended it might be the means of his protracting his stay in the office, as such a course would be most dishonourable. Yet he has exactly been a party to that very thing, and each time he writes is jubilant over his own dishonesty.

A "Daisy" Returning-Officer.

Sir Richard Cartwright will ask on Tuesday next whether the Government are aware that Charles Young, one of the Deputy Returning-officers at the last two elections held in the County of Haldimand, and one of the parties at whose polls whose irregularities are alleged to have occurred, had served a term of imprisonment for theft in the Central Prison at Toronto prior to his appointment by the Government.—Globe, March 28.
