## W. C. T. U. Department.

The regular meeting of the W. C. T. U.  
Union will be held in the Temperance  
Hall, on Friday, April 6, at 3 p.m.  
sharp. The Band of Hope will assem-  
ble on the same date at 4 p.m.

There are three things you may do  
with the liquor traffic, you may let it  
entirely alone; you may endeavor to  
restrict it, or you may pass laws which  
demand the immediate and entire  
destruction of the traffic. Some men  
say, "Let whiskey alone and it will let  
you alone! Will it? A little girl is  
shivering in rags on the street. What  
brought her to this? "Whiskey," she  
says. "But she has let it alone all her  
life. A heart-broken mother sobs over  
her son in a drunkard's grave. She  
too has let whiskey alone. A broker  
sits in his place of business. Of course,  
since he lets whiskey alone it lets him  
alone. Listen to his answer; "Whis-  
key, sir, lessens my receipts, quadruples  
my expenses, debauches my employees,  
destroys my confidence in my cus-  
tomers. Does it let me alone?"

## FERMENTED WINE IS NOT THE "FRUIT OF THE VINE."

It is not generally understood that  
fermented wine, or alcoholic wine in its  
purest, cleanest form, made from choice  
clean grapes, is not a product of nature  
at all, but a product of rotteness, cor-  
ruption and decay; that all the nourish-  
ment in the grape and everything good  
in it, except the water, have been  
utterly rotted out, and destroyed, and  
that only the water, a portion of the  
rotted decomposed sugar now turned  
into a deadly fatal poison, and a slight  
flavor and color of the grape remain in  
the wine; that precisely the same  
thing can be made by rotting and fer-  
menting any kind of grain or fruit,  
potato or vegetable that contains starch  
or sugar. In alcoholic wine there is  
nothing of the juices of the grape or  
fruit of the vine-nothing that was in  
the vine or grape except the water,  
which is not a product of the vine at all.

## A BAD FIRE.

"Jones, have you heard of the fire  
that burned up the man's house prop-  
erty?"  
"No, Smith; where was it?"  
"Quite near here."  
"What a misfortune to him! Was  
it a good house?"  
"Yes, a nice house—a good home  
for any family."  
"What a pity! How did the fire  
take place?"  
"The man played with fire, and  
thoughtlessly set it going himself."  
"How silly! Did you say it is all  
burned out, too?"  
"Yes, all gone."  
"That is singular. It must have  
been a terribly hot fire."  
"No, it was not a very hot fire. In-  
deed, it was so small that it attracted  
but little attention; it burned a long  
time—more than twenty years. And  
though it seemed to consume very  
slowly, yet it wore away about five  
pounds' worth every year, till it was  
all gone."  
"I can't understand you yet. Tell  
me where the fire was kindled, and all  
about it."  
"Well, then, it was kindled in the  
bowl of a pipe, and on the end of a  
cigar. His smoking cost him, he him-  
self told me, nearly ten shillings per  
month;—the money was worth to him  
at least ten per cent, and that rate  
it would double in about every  
seven years, so that the whole sum

would be more than five hundred  
pounds. Don't you pity the family of  
the man who has slowly burned up  
their homes?"

"Whew! I suppose you mean me,  
for I have smoked more than twenty  
years. But it doesn't cost so much as  
that, and I haven't any house of my  
own. Have always rented—thought I  
was too poor to own a house. And I  
because I have been burning it up!  
What a fool I have been!"

It is the mission of the W. C. T. U.  
to aid in hastening forward the day  
when statesmen shall represent the  
hopes of the nation, instead of the  
liquor power, and whose shrine may at  
present bow and worship; and for the  
consummation of this glad end we will  
continue our earnest efforts in hope of  
deliverance.

against rum will do much to lessen its  
use and cause others to shun it as a  
viper.

The liquor men pay for such

fore." Many people do not see through  
it, and, so, swallow it as gospel truth.  
The Catholic Total Abstinence Union  
of Philadelphia has passed a resolution  
that it is inconsistent with the pledge  
of a member to sign a liquor-dealer's  
petition for license or go on his bond.


