Customs duties collected at Hamilton last month amounted to \$61,076.

A new engine and boiler was put into the saw mill on Monday.

Silt has been struck at Glencoe at a depth of 1265 feet. The bed is said to be about 75 feet through.

Waterford Board of Health has decided that there shall be no pig pens in the centre of the Village.

The Fall Show of the Townsend Agricultural Society will be held on Tuesday and Wednesday, Oct. 2nd and 3rd.

The date of the West Haldimand Spring Show to be held at Hagersville is changed to April 25 instead of April 26.

The prisoner Gilbert, who assaulted young Blake at Paris some time ago and fled to Rochester, has been brought back for trial.

The Bank of Commerce is making a strong bid for the Hagersville business of the Bank of Hamilton, which closes business there on April 10.

The market ticket is still issued over the Northern & North Western Branch of the Grand Trunk. Parties going to Hamilton can get down and back for Single fare (\$1.00) on Saturday's.

Coal was found at a depth of 72 feet on J. Wilcox's farm, South Grimsby, near Smithville, recently, but it appears the vein is only eight inches thick and will not be worked as it would not pay.

An application for a divorce made by Mrs. White, of Port Dover, has been accepted by the Standing Orders Committee, Dominion Senate, and the bill will be introduced immediately.

Cornelius V. Vanderbilt sent \$10 to each of the engineers and conductors and \$5 to the firemen and brakemen who had charge of the train with which he made the special run over the M. C. R. a few days since.

The Stratford Times says: "Mr. Wood, deputy postmaster, of Mitchell, is 88 years of age and has never had a day's illness during all those long years. But then he is a bachelor and was never editor of a newspaper."

A series of Scott Act meetings under the auspices of the Charlotteville Temperance Association will be held in different parts of Norfolk County from 27th to 30th inclusive. Rev. C. W. Dean, of Hamilton, and T. W. Jackson, of Jarvis, are announced to speak.

Merchants should carefully examine all ten-dollar bills that may be tendered them, in view of the fact that a large number of five-dollar bills raised to ten dollars have been discovered in circulation. They were principally on the Imperial Bank, with a few on the Traders'. Recently counterfeit five dollar United States silver certificates have been sent into circulation, besides a large number of two dollar bills.

An incident happened yesterday at the diamond crossing King St., which might have ended seriously. A carriage containing three ladies, was driven up the track for the purpose of allowing its occupants to alight. Somehow one of the wheels became fastened in the rails thus preventing the horses from going ahead. Just then a train loomed into view which caused considerable excitement for a short time. The timely assistance of the M. C. R. employes and others alone prevented a serious accident. Parties should bear in mind that the track is not the proper place to stop upon, unless they desire a repetition of the above.—Hagersville News.

The second meeting of Jarvis fire department met in Music Hall Wednesday evening March 28, quite a large number of citizens present. After discussing the merits of several engines the opinion of the meeting was about equally divided between the Brantford and Onemee engines, and a resolution was passed that the committee make further enquiries and report at the next meeting Wednesday evening April 11. Mr. Jas. Noble was appointed treasurer and all persons who have subscribed can pay their subscriptions in at any time and all those who have not subscribed can do so.

BINDER TWINE COMBINATION "BUSTED."—Messrs. Morris & Brother, of Montreal who tried so long to defend themselves and the binder twine combination against the letters of McDonald and the newspapers that took the question up, have issued a circular letter to the trade stating that they had withdrawn from the combination and that they will in future carry on their business on an independent basis. Of course they will still shelter under the N. P., but they will have to meet independent opposition from other Canadian makers, who will also break from the combination. Mr. Thos. McDonald may now congratulate himself that he had much to do with breaking up this combine, as against his exposures of the past few months these leeches were afraid to face the investigating committee appointed to inquire into the various combines.

CHEESE MEETING.—The cheese meeting in Music Hall on Saturday was well attended. The meeting was called to order at 3 o'clock Jos. Ivey in the chair. The minutes of last meeting were read and approved and William Hind was appointed secretary for the ensuing year. The Treasurer's report was given to Bank of Commerce where all cheques will be paid. The salesmen are the same as last year. The secretary's report was read and seemed satisfactory to the patrons after which the patrons voted the proprietor a present of \$75. Out of 50 patrons present there was not one dissenting vote. The report showed that the average price per pound of cheese for the season, from the 1st of May to the end of October was 10 & 69-100 cents the same including April 11 cents and the price per 100 lbs of milk from the 1st of May '82 and 13-100 cents and taking in April the amount to 100 lbs of milk would be 84 and 43-100. Mr. Parkinson says he would like some of the cheese men that have been canvassing on his territory to show as good a record, (in print) or else pay their patrons the remaining \$500 to \$1000 it would take to make a good record, or else be kind enough to quit saying I sold my cheese as high as Parkinson did.—C. O.
