Pickings from Hagersville.

Mr. Editor:
Judging from the appearance of our
own and other country newspapers it ap-
pears to be the correct thing to have
neighboring towns and villages repre-
sented by correspondents in each of the
papers. As Hagersville is not "taken
up" by any of your correspondents. I
will with your permission try to keep
you posted regarding our doings. I
am not an expert at this kind of work,
like our "Hoe Yyess," the local scribe
that represent the Sachern, or the des-
penser of "chronicles" that tickles
the student of model local newspapers,
viz: The readers of the Times.

We have a very carefully prepared and
bought with strict party experience,
when the market was low, class of news-
papers here. The rapid growth of the
political ideas and a slight pricking of
animosity has resulted in the birth
of The News. The Times changed its
coat from Tory to Grit under the pur-
chase of it by the present proprietor,
and the Tories consequently "got
mad," and The News was brought
forth from the dark place of travail
and is now being tenderly nursed by
our late undertaker and his son.

The Indian pay day came to hand on
Friday. The newly appointed Indian
Agent, Dr. P. E. Jones, proceeded to the
Mississauga Council house and paid
the natives the amount of interest
money due from the Government.
Quite a large sum of money is placed
at the disposal of the Indians in this way,
and from general observation on Satur-
day, considerable of it was deposited
for fire water. The Indians are pre-
paring plans for a new school house,
to be built near the Council House, under
the agency of Dr. Jones. Many of the
grievances of past days are being
straightened out, and a fair distribu-
tion of justice meted out to all.

Considerable agitation is taking place
here, regarding the establishment of
some kind of manufacturing enterprise.
Several feasible schemes are being
brought out, and it is expected that
definite action will be taken to form
organizations for the purpose of work-
ing them.

Dr. W. H. Lindsay, V. S., a graduate
of Toronto College, has decided to re-
main here and practice his profession.
With that end in view he has estab-
lished his office at Satter's Drug Store,
and will be ready to attend to the
ailments of the dumb creation. Suc-

Considerable interest is being taken
in our town by the manufacturers of
chemical fire appliances. Two exhibi-
tions during the week. We must have
some kind of protection and that
speedily, whatever it may be, will be
hailed with delight by our insurance-
policy holders, who are paying such
high rates for being protected.

Messrs. J. & P. R. Howard, have
conferred a boon upon the townspeople
by sounding their large whistle at the
hours of 7, 12, 1 and 6.

The town fathers made a tour of in-
spection on Thursday and will soon
commence to remedy existing defects.
Horse buyers were in town on Fri-
day and Saturday and captured some
fine horses, good prices being paid.
I met the genial Town Clerk on
Saturday and asked, what is the news
Mr. Scott? Just bought a farm, was
his reply, and away he went for Hager's
Block. It proved to be true. He has
purchased the Winkworth farm, Mr.
Winkworth is selling his farm stock by
auction and intends settling down here,
having bought the Armstrong property
to the west of the town.

What are we going to do about a
Bank? Is the question that meets our
business man in the face. It is hard to
say just what will be done. Mr.
Grassett the popular manager of the
Bank of Commerce, of your town
was here on Saturday and I believe
carried away a good many accounts
with him. It will be a matter of ac-
commodation only, as something must be
done here at once. There is a strong
talk of forming a company to conduct
the business. It will never do for the
New York of Haldimand to do its
banking in the Brooklyn of its circum-
ference. The best thing will be to
locate Mr. Grassett here, and make
Caledonia, Jarvis, Selkirk and adjourning
villages tributary to his agency.

The Methodist of our town have
been hoping to secure Rev. W. W.
Baer, of your town, and are very much
disappointed to see that he is trans-
ferred to the B. C. conference.

The planing mills will be in full
blast this week.

The following persons are recent
ones. Mr. George Philp and family
have removed to St. Thomas; Mrs.
Davidson and sister to Chicago; Mr.
Robert Carr, to N. W. T.; Mr. G.
Gough, of Waterford locates here; Dr.
Lindsay of Toronto, and Chas. Wink-
worth; of Walpole also settle here.

Contracts are let for five residences,
for Reeve Howard and Mr. George
Mealy, and the remodeling of Mr.
Thos. Harrison's residence.

We are in need of another M. D. to
fill the vacancy caused by the departure
of Dr. Sturgeon. It is rumored around
that the ladies are trying to persuade
a certain well known female medical to
locate here. A good practice is wait-
ing for some one.

It is rumored that one of the busi-
ness men of your town has bought out
one of our most enterprising men and
will take possession at an early date.
The latter is going to locate in the N.
W. T. His removal will be a decided
loss to our town.

One of the leading lights in the his-
tory of our town, Mr. Chas. Hager,
has retired from all business cares and
will spend the remainder of his days
in well earned home comforts. He has
resigned his position as Post Master,
and is succeeded by his son, Mr. J. H.
Hager, who has been officially placed
in charge, and will add many improve-
ments to the office. In retiring from
public life, the father of the town car-
ries with him the highest regards of
the business men of the place, and as
he gave the honest and well known
name that was a heritage to him, to
his adapted abiding place, in such
measure his townspeople, wish that
they meet out to him their desires, and
wishes for a long life of "peace on
earth," with the partner of his joys
and sorrows, and among the well-known

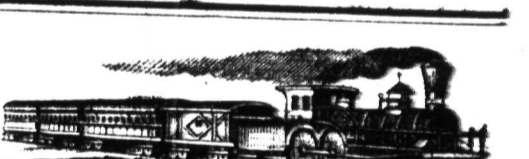
