From the edition of Geo. P. Rowell & Co's "American Newspaper Directory," published April 2d (its twentieth year), it appears that the Newspapers and Periodicals of all kinds issued in the United States and Canada, now number 16,310, showing a gain of 890 during the last three months and of 7,136 in 10 years. The publishers of the Directory assert that the impression that when the proprietor of a newspaper undertakes to state what has been his exact circulation, he does not generally tell the truth is an erroneous one; and they conspicuously offer a reward of \$100 for every instance in their book for this year, where it can be shown that the detailed report received from a publisher was untrue.

#### TO THE EDITOR OF THE RECORD.

Sir,—Mr. Parker does not like the tone of my letter. I did not expect he would. No one will more than once attempt kind words and caresses to the snarling and vicious cur that barks at ones heels—neither will that animal approve of the kick which is the only effectual means of disposing of him. Observe the reply to Mr. Bourne's letter which even Mr. P. admits was courteous. Instead of answering his challenge to show that there were more errors against Reformers than Conservatives, he changes the subject and to cover his retreat, indirectly accuses Mr. Bourne of defrauding the township.

His attempted explanation of the corner I drove him into on the "declared lists" is too thin. I am authorized by Mr. Inouson to say that neither did he send or prepare any declared list. The only charitable construction that I can put on Mr. P's "recollections" is that his dreams are so vivid that they impress him as actual facts.

I can afford to smile at his mud-throwing and name-calling—they are so puerile as to be beneath my notice.

In regard to the town lines, I give you the following facts. Three or four years ago Canboro and Moulton demanded that the County should build a bridge over the Oswego creek. The County refused, but after a suit involving heavy costs was compelled to, and did build it. The judges in appeal ruled the law was compulsory and not permissive. Subsequent to this the County Councilors agreed mutually—that it would be cheaper for the townships to assume all bridges under 25 feet span—though told by the County Solicitor that their resolution could not be enforced if objected to. Had it not been for the serious illness of Mr. Stevenson I would have sent for his written opinion, so that your readers might have compared it with that of the "fireside lawyer."

I was amused at Mr. P's accusation that I am in some way responsible for the trials and tribulations of the new Treasurer and his bondsmen. I deny that I have had anything so far to do with the delay.—I am and have been ready for a transfer of the books and funds at a moments notice whenever lawfully and properly called upon for them. As yet I have not been asked in any form for them. When they are demanded I shall ask for an audit of the expenditures—amounting to date, April 7th, to \$949.10 from Jan. 1st 1888.

I have already seen too much of the blundering and incapacity of the majority in the Council and its nominees to office to assume any responsibility for their work, as I would have to do without an audit.

In conclusion, I regret, when I recall from his letters the numerous instances of "bearing false witness" against his neighbors, that Mr. P. should have so completely forgotten or ignored the teachings of his shorter catechism. I fear the demoralizing practices of the recruiting sergeant have entirely supplanted them. He will find however that the readers of THE RECORD and the electors of Walpole are not so easily gulled as the unfortunate recruits that were bamboozled into taking his shilling.
