An unfortunate accident occurred on the Stage road, Walpole, last Tuesday night. Mr. John McBurney, one of the oldest residents in the Township was coming, as he said when last seen alive, to Jarvis to see his aged mother. The night was pitch dark and it is supposed he changed his mind, as his horse and rig was found at the gate in the morning, and in attempting to turn round where the road is narrow opposite Devenies, was thrown out of his buggy into a gully seven or eight feet deep which was running with water from the recent rain. His dead body was not found till next afternoon though scores of people had driven past it during the day. The unfortunate man had been drinking some and was partially intoxicated when last seen, but he was also a sufferer from heart disease, either of which causes, or perhaps the stem from his fall, may account for his being suffocated by such a small amount of water. His watch was filled with water, and stopped very shortly after he was last seen alive. No inquest was held. The funeral took place on Friday proceeding from his late residence to Chalmers' Church, Erie.

A dreadful accident which caused the almost instantaneous death of a young man named Charles Smith occurred at Godby's sawmill, Glenora, about five o'clock on Monday evening, 9th inst. It appears the engine had been stopped to permit of some repairs. When steam was turned on again the engine did not start, being on a dead centre. Smith put one of his feet against one of the spokes of the fly-wheel to give it a start. Full pressure from the boiler had been turned on, and when the wheel started it moved so suddenly and furiously as to throw him over itself. He struck a post and rebounded against the wheel, which dragged him down under the floor of the mill through the opening in which it ran. When the engine was stopped and the unfortunate man taken out, it was found that his skull was smashed, his breast broken in, and that his death must have been almost instantaneous. He was otherwise badly mangled. The spokes of the fly-wheel, which were of iron 1 1/2 inch thick by 5 inches wide, were bent and broken, and this fact gives one a very good idea of the tremendous force with which the body of the unfortunate young man was hurled about. The deceased had been employed in the mill only a week. He was about 35 years old, and married, and leaves a wife and two children—a boy and a girl—to mourn his loss. He returned to this part of the country from Nebraska last winter.—Tilsburg Observer.
