TO THE EDITOR OF THE RECORD:

SIR,—The transformation of *Ex-Officer into a Tory Treasurer* "points a moral" well worth the attention of your readers. You perceive he is "a Tory Treasurer, not the Treasurer of the Township of Walpole. Our Township consists of about 750 Reformers and 150 Tories (in round numbers) yet these officers and the Tory Councils they served under never have given much thought to the Reform half of the Township. This is just what I have complained of, and the gist of the whole matter. To recapitulate The Council used their office to buy up the votes of the county by voting away the tolls on the Caledonia and Cayuga bridges. Offering to build half the York bridge, and by taking up our town lines and bridges as County roads which costs us from double to four times the amount those roads were costing us before they voted this arrangement.

The Township officers have used their office to garble the Voters' Lists against the Reform Party, and in the interest of the Conservative Party. While in the Reform Townships correct Lists have been made by the Reform officers, "Tory Treasurers" refuses that the Conservatives won the election by the aid of the "declared lists," as explained in my first letter, which proves him to be entirely corrupt in his political opinions, and ideas. He states Mr. Bourne took no part in these "declared lists," but Mr. Colin G. Snyder the President of the Conservative Association told me Mr. Bourne sent in one of those "declared lists." All I set out to show to your readers in my first letter in regard to these lists has been abundantly proven.

The only new matter requiring my attention is "Tory Treasurers" reference to *Starved Cattle*, and in regard to that I may say. If he has put up his shingle as a Cow Doctor, he may in time if he eschews politics, get a share of the business.

If there are bad votes on the municipal list of 1887 Tory Treasurers should have told us who put them on? No Reformer ever put them there, and the act states "every person on the List" can vote if they take the oath when required and no question of qualification can be raised at the election.

So perhaps Tory Treasurer and his friends will make a correct list next time they try, that is all we shall ask from them.

SAD ACCIDENT.—One of the most painful accidents which ever occurred in this vicinity took place on Tuesday afternoon last, and resulted in the death of Mr. Wm. Mugford, of this village. The particulars of the calamity, so far as can be gathered, are as follows:—Messrs. W. Mugford, G. McDonald and A. McLeod were employed in digging a well on the premises of Mr. Geo. Sturdy, and had succeeded in reaching a depth of over sixty feet when they concluded to curb it. The lower curb, 12 feet in length, had reached to within four feet of the bottom and was there wedged in the well. Messrs. Mugford and McDonald then descended (although the latter was very reluctant to do so) to the top of the curb, where they were engaged in forcing it to the bottom. Behind the curb was a layer of sand several feet in thickness, which McDonald thought might cave in on the descent of the curb, and he advised Mugford to come with him at once out of the well. The latter, however, was reluctant to accede to the proposal and, therefore, struck the curb when it suddenly dropped, to the bottom, setting free the sand, which at once caved in and sent both men to the bottom, a distance of 12 feet, and fastened them knee deep in the bottom. McDonald immediately extricated himself, but had no sooner done so than another excavation buried him nearly to the chest, while strange to say but little fell on his comrade. With this McDonald made a desperate effort and in some mysterious way climbed to the top of the curb. Mugford called for the rope which on being lowered he grasped but was unable to hold. He then on being advised, placed the rope around him, but shouted to them to refrain from winding as it was hurting him, and requested them at the top to lower a spade so that he might dig himself out. While this was being done more sand caved in, reaching his chest, when he exclaimed, "O God, I am dying." Immediately more sand fell in burying

him to the depth of three or four feet. McDonald then climbed the rope to the top and after a little consideration at the risk of the great risk of his life again descended to dig for his comrade, which he did, only to find him standing erect but lifeless. The calamity has cast a pall of gloom over the whole community, but over none so much at his beloved wife, who with her only child have the heart-felt sympathy of the whole neighborhood. The funeral took place on Thursday last, when a large number of friends followed the remains to Goderich cemetery. Deceased was a young man, just entering the prime of life, and was respected by all. —Holmesville correspondent of the Clinton New Era.

Quite a number of our citizens met in Music Hall, on Thursday evening, but not as many as there might have and should have been, but nevertheless, what was there were in favor of a protection against fire of some kind. At 9 p.m. the meeting was called to order. Mr. Bryce Allen in the chair, when Mr. B. Mullenbacher was asked for a report of what he had done towards raising funds with the subscription list. Mr. B. stated he had something like \$65 signed and he had only canvassed a few of the merchants. Messrs. C. E. Bourne, Lewis Miller and J. C. Sanderson then gave their opinions on the question, Mr. Bourne stated that he thought if the town had a fire company it would lessen the insurance rate $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. Mr. Sanderson after giving the meeting a few pointers as to the causes of fire, said he would subscribe \$5 towards the cause, and the following motions were put before the meeting.

(1) Moved by Mr. Sanderson, seconded by Mr. Peterson, That \$20 of the money subscribed be spent in purchasing Hooks and Ladders.—Carried.

(2) Moved by Mr. Sanderson, seconded by J. W. Rodgers, that Messrs. Mullenbacher, Miller, and Chambers act as a committee, to canvas the town by subscription and to seek information as to cost and what would be the most suitable, a fire engine or a force pump with tank on wheels and report at the next meeting.—Carried.

(3) Moved by J. W. Rodgers, seconded by Mr. J. Noble, that this meeting do now adjourn until Wednesday evening, at 8 o'clock, March 23th.—Carried.
