John Riddle was killed by a falling tree Thursday afternoon in the bush near Copetown.

The funeral of the late Benjamin J. Morgan at Hamilton Wednesday was largely attended.

The Prince of Wales' Own Rifles of Kingston are contemplating a visit to Ottawa this summer.

East Durham Conservatives will send a representative to the funeral of the late Senator Plum.

Hamilton music lovers have hopes of inducing Gilmore's band to visit that village this spring.

James Murray, landing waiter at the Kingston Custom House, was superannuated yesterday.

Captain Gaskin and his son, while driving on the ice near Kingston, narrowly escaped drowning.

The St. Thomas Free Library Board will petition Parliament to remove the duty on books for public libraries.

A combination of builders, contractors, and dealers in building materials have been formed in Hamilton.

Brantford has a fire brigade difficulty on hand, resulting from a dispute between the two branches about the election of a chief.

Miss Dismore, the evangelist, who is laboring in Kingston, says she never met with such lifelessness in any place she has yet visited.

Fred. Whitehead, license commissioner's clerk at Winnipeg, is missing, and the Government auditors are investigating his accounts.

John Higgins, who was seriously injured at the recent fatal accident at the Barwell street railway crossing, London, is slowly recovering.

Another Montreal jury has distinguished itself by acquitting a prisoner whose guilt had been established in the strongest possible manner.

A frame house just outside Brantford, occupied by H. Bloomfield, was burned on Tuesday evening. The loss was \$750, insured for \$300 in the city.

Lambert, a Scott Act informer at Yarmouth, N. S., admitted in court Thursday that he had perjured himself at the instance of Local Prosecutor Barrill.

Robt. McQuillan, an old Hamilton carter, was Wednesday struck on the head with an iron weight by a young man named Parrett, and seriously injured.

The Hamilton Philharmonic Society have decided to engage Miss Lizzie Webb, Cary and Miss Alma Del Martin, of New York, for their concert on April 6.

Some over zealous French-Canadian journals in Montreal are taking advantage of the marks of respect shown to the dead Emperor in that city to insult his memory.

Hugh Jones, of Malahide, was fined \$50 and costs at Aylmer Friday for practising medicine without proper authority, and having no money, went to jail for thirty days.

The mission of Premier Greenway to Ottawa is said to have resulted in failure. Messrs. Greenway and Martin say they can get no satisfaction from Sir John and the Ministers.

The Michigan Central does not assume the ownership of Niagara Falls, but it does offer to its passengers from its station at Falls view, the grandest and most comprehensive spectacle that the great cataract affords. It is the only road that runs directly by the falls, and from this point all parts of the cataract, the angry rapids above and the boiling cauldron below, are in full view. At this season, when the cliffs are hung with gigantic icicles, and the trees and shrubbery covered with curious formations of frozen spray, the scene reaches, in the language of Bayard Taylor, "the climax of beauty."
