CURRENT NOTES

—A heavy snow storm struck New York City Sunday and Monday of last week and greatly impeded travel besides doing much damage.

—According to the minister of the Interior's Report, 521,791 acres of land was taken up by settlers and sold in Manitoba and the North-West, during 1887.

—The wealthiest man in the Ontario Legislature is Robert Ferguson, member for East Kent. He is a bachelor lives at Thamesville, and is worth a million.

—The Dominion estimates have been laid before parliament, the past year exhibits a surplus over expenditure of \$500,000. This is very gratifying and an indication of the increasing prosperity of the country.

—A measure of great importance to property owners all over Ontario was passed by the Municipal Committee Friday week. It is a bill framed by Mr. O'Connor, which transfers the power of selling lands for taxes from the county treasurers to the treasurers of township and villages.

—A recent Government return shows the total number of men employed by the Grand Trunk in Ontario. There are 103 conductors, 181 engineers, 184 brakemen, 151 firemen, 776 sectionmen and trackmen, 888 office station and yard men, and 30 whose employment is not given. The total number is 2,979.

—A return brought down by Mr. Hardy in the Assembly shows that last year \$93,215 was received for Scott Act fines in counties, and \$31,465 in cities and towns. Middlesex received the largest amount of any single county—\$19,094; Northumberland and Durham received \$7,001; Port Hope \$2,922 and Cobourg \$1,500. The sum of \$10,150 was collected in the town of Peterboro.—Globe.

—At the Commercial Union Meeting held in Port Dover, last week. The attendance during the day was good, and the discussion at times, quite animated. The speakers who favored more extended trade relations with the United States were Messrs. Varenay Fuller and Thos. Shaw of Hamilton. The restrictionist orators were Messrs. John Nickerson of Simcoe, L. G. Morgan of Port Dover and W. F. McLean a youth from the office of the Toronto World. At the conclusion a vote was taken when it was found that the audience was with Messrs. Shaw and Fuller in the proportion of about 6 to 4.

—The death of Hon. J. B. Plumb, Speaker of the Senate of Canada occurred at his residence, Niagara on Monday morning last at ten o'clock. His death was from apoplexy and very sudden and unexpected, causing general surprise and genuine regret. Deceased was a prominent member of the Conservative party having been the representative in that interest for Niagara from 1874 till 1882 when his constituency was abolished. Soon afterwards he was appointed to the Senate, of which Assembly he was last session elected Speaker.

Mr. Plumb was the son of an Episcopal clergyman and was born at East Haven, Conn., being at the time of his death seventy-two years of age. He was a zealous, faithful member of his political party, an active worker in election campaigns. Personally he possessed many attractive qualities, being a gentleman in every sense, highly cultivated and widely informed.

Friday night while playing with a dynamite cartridge, a nephew of Mark Wilson, farmer, living on townline near Naber, had his thumb and first and second fingers, of his left hand, blown off also the right hand burned. On Saturday the lad who is about 11 years old came to town and Dr. Bennett amputated the thumb and first finger and dressed the wounds. We understand the lad is doing well.
