HE HAD A POOR CHOICE.

It was either give up \$21,000 or His Life.

A WEALTHY BANKER'S DISAGREEABLE ALTERNATIVE—A ROBBER PLAYS A DESPERATE GAME AGAINST HEAVY ODDS AND WINS.

DENVER, COL., March 29.—The boldest and most successful bank robbery ever reported in the west was perpetrated upon First National bank this afternoon. Yesterday morning a well-dressed man, with a light moustache and complexion and of medium height, walked into the bank and asked where he could see Mr. Moffatt, president of the bank. He was told he could see Mr. Moffatt, who is also president of the Denver and Rio Grande railway, at the president's office in the Cheeseman block. This morning the stranger entered the railway office and asked to see Mr. Moffatt on important business. He was admitted to his private room, and stated that he had discovered a conspiracy whereby the bank was to be robbed of a large sum. Mr. Moffatt, being very busy, asked the man to meet him at his private office in the bank at 1 o'clock. A few minutes after the hour appointed he called at the bank and was shown into the president's office. Remaining standing, he inquired if Cashier S. N. Wood was in, and was told that he was at lunch. He then asked for a blank check for the purpose of showing how the robbery was to be perpetrated. He laid the check upon the desk in front of Mr. Moffatt, and said: "I will have to do this myself," and pulling out a large revolver, placed it at Mr. Moffatt's head, and in an earnest but unexcited manner, said: "I want \$21,000 and am going to have it. I have considered this matter and the consequences if I fail and am arrested. I am penniless and a desperate man and have been driven during the past week to that point where I have considered suicide as the only means of escape from the poverty and misery in which I exist. You have millions and I am determined to have what I asked for. If you make a noise, call a man or ring a bell I will blow your brains out and then blow up the building and myself with this bottle of glycerine (which he at that moment pulled out of another pocket.) Now, take your choice." Mr. Moffatt started to argue with the man, but he was stopped with the information that it was useless and that he had but two minutes in which to fill out the check before him for \$21,000 if he desired to live. Mr. Moffatt, seeing no other alternative, filled out the check and was ordered to take it to the paying teller and get it cashed. Mr. Moffatt left his office, and with the man behind him with the revolver partially concealed under his overcoat, and with the muzzle aimed straight at Mr. Moffatt's back, marched behind the counter up to Paying Teller, Kealey with the request that the check be immediately cashed. They then remarched into Moffatt's office without attracting the attention of the fifteen or twenty clerks who were at work within two feet of where they passed. After they had remained in the private office three or four minutes, the robber informed Mr. Moffatt that they were wasting time, and that he had better step to the door and motion his teller to come to him, which he did. Mr. Moffatt instructed the tell to bring the money into his office, and as the teller turned to go away the robber told him he wanted twenty \$1,000 bills and \$1,000 in gold. The money was brought in and handed to the robber, who, waiting until the teller had reached his desk, backed out to the front door, making Mr. Moffatt remain standing in his door until he had reached the curb stone. He then raised his hat and walked around the corner, and has not yet been heard of. Mr. Moffatt is completely prostrated with the shock. Detectives are out after the man, but no trace of him has been found.

The eighteenth time he sees painfully how much he is in need of that particular article. The nineteenth time he counts his money to see how much he would have left if he bought it. The twentieth time he rushes frantically forth and buys it.

Joseph Walsh was set on and robbed in broad daylight Sunday, on Tecumseh street Toronto.

Rev. G. M. Milligan preached Sunday on the alleged aggressiveness of the Church of Rome.

Ex-King Milan visited the Sultan Sunday evening and was received with imposing ceremonies.

Cambridge won the annual intercollegiate boat race on the Thames on Saturday by two lengths.

Mrs. Kemmler, who was so badly hacked by her husband with a hatchet in Buffalo, has died without regaining consciousness.

The immediate relations of those who lost their lives in the wreck at Simcoe will be entitled to pensions under the general law.

John Bright, the great English Liberal, died at 8.30 on Wednesday morning, after a long illness. His end was painless.

The new hospital for women, established by the Sisterhood of St. John the Living, was opened on Saturday.

The steamer Countess of Flinders was run into by the Belgian mail steamer of Dunkirk on Friday and fourteen persons lost their lives.

The union carpenters and painters of Buffalo will strike next Monday for nine hours' work at ten hours' pay. About 2,000 men will be involved.

The house of Rev. Mr. Stillwell, of Sydenham, was badly injured by dynamite on Saturday morning. The perpetrator of the outrage is not known.

The remains of John Bright were interred on Saturday in the cemetery at Rocked by the funeral ceremonies being of the simplest and plainest character.

Two freight trains collided at Jamestown, N. Y. Sunday. Both engines were wrecked and fifteen freight cars destroyed. Conductor Yoeman was fatally and two others badly hurt.

The office of postmistress at Lexington Va., was offered to the widow of Stonewell Jackson by President Harrison and P. M. General Wamamaker, but she for various reasons declined it.

Jerry Farnsworth died recently near Buffalo in supposed poverty. A hunt through his effects disclosed \$20,000 in greenbacks, which were dusty and musty.
