Great quantities of maple sugar and syrup are arriving in Montreal.

A new sect called the Christians Scientists has been founded in Montreal.

Prairie fires have done considerable damage in Southwestern Manitoba.

The Fall River strikers have decided to return to work on the old basis.

Taseott, the Chicago murderer, has turned up again, this time in Arkansas.

The Lambton Assizes opened Wednesday. There are several important cases.

Voting on Scott Act repeal will take place in Leeds and Grenville on April 25th.

Chief of Police Murphy, of Ingersoll, has been dismissed for alleged neglect of duty.

Hon. J. Lloyd Thomas, of New York, spoke at a Scott Act meeting in Whiteby last night.

Three of the boys who escaped from Mimico Industrial School were captured at St. Mary's on Tuesday. During the night two of them, Graham and Churchill, escaped from the lock-up and are still at large.
