TO THE EDITOR OF THE JARVIS RECORD:

DEAR SIR:—The comments of the youthful inkling of the Hagersville News regarding the Acts of the County Council at their March meeting has just come under my notice and as the principal of that printing company is no other than the chief officer and representative of the municipality of Hagersville. Some of our Walpole citizens may think his remarks have some foundation. I cannot see anything criminal in the appointment of Mr. Colter as County Clerk and Solicitor. It is believed he will be a very efficient officer. Regarding Mr. Lalor's comments, when an office becomes vacant through death or otherwise (provided the salary was remunerative) the family holds no further claim upon us either in justice or in law. The best interests of the County are to be considered, and in my mind such will be the case in this appointment, not only by his ability, but the place of residence as well. As to the vote electing Mr. Colter, Mr. Lalor's amendment was lost on a tie vote. See Sec. 241 Municipal Act, "any question on which there is an equality of votes shall be deemed to be negative." This resolution was then dead. The only motion then for consideration was the original motion, which was supported by Mr. Michner, why even the reeve of Hagersville could have legally voted for it; the Warden also supported the original motion. See Municipal Act "The head of the Council may vote with other members on all questions." How can any person claim that Mr. Colter was not legally elected? He would have been elected without the vote of Mr. Michner.

Then the county printing: there were three tenders for this work, two legal tenders one illegal, the latter the tail end of the Hagersville News Vis & Son, as you doubtless are aware no member of any Council has a right to become a contractor. Messrs. Weatherby and Whitte represent two distinct journals of different shades of politics. They offer to do all the printing required to be done for the County agreeable to notice received from the County Clerk, publish all proceedings, and insert all advertisements in both papers for \$130. Mr. Saul words his tender as follows: "I will do all of the ordinary printing of the County for \$118." Nothing said about the advertising required at the County Town of Dunnville. The former tender is bound to supply the necessary advertising that cannot be done by them. Any person void of prejudice should see which of the tenders should receive the approval of the Council. He then excuses the reeve of Walpole because their Council paid \$90 too much for our assessor, he seems to be generally out. The Council have the fixing of the salaries of the different municipal offices and the appointment; but when a resolution couples the salary with the name of the appointee it becomes a tender; there you if you adopt this plan, change your Council Chamber into an Auditor room, instead of a legislative body, which is strongly condemned. He would have some very queer advts in his municipal manual, should he publish me, it might sell North-west of this town, but not a ready sale even there. Our Council last year mutually agreed that the salary of the assessor at \$130 was fairly low when the office was robbed of its pickings. The only reason I can assign for his personal attack on our Reeve is because he did not move to give the News the County printing, take it cool. You cannot expect to brow-beat the County Council into a violation of the municipal law for your benefit, even if the biggest half of you is Reeve. Low and behold a follower of Joseph, under the title of justice appears next. His first salute "from the Warden down to J. W. Holmes" (this I believe excludes the Reeve of Hagersville). I should imagine that "justice" from his tone to be more in grief over the last parliamentary election than that of the appointment of Mr. Colter as Clerk and Solicitor. The Warden discharged his duty in an honorable straight-forward way, nor did he compel any person to vote differently from that he desired. The rules of Council require each member to vote for or against. The recording of the vote is a record of how you did vote. You are asked "how did you vote," not how do you vote. The late Clerk has ruled on this question frequently, when a member attempted to have his name recorded differently from the way he had voted. The appointment of Clerk was largely political, but not purely as one of the reformers voted for Mr. Swezie, Justice is in err when he couples the county printing, it was non-political and in no way connected with the Clerk's appointment. Mr. White is editor of the Gazette, and Mr. Weatherby the Reform, so both political parties are served, it thus will not meet the

views of Justice, then he should change his name to that of Tory or Conservative would be too liberal for him. For again says "I believe Mr. Michner's vote was not legally recorded for Mr. Colter and consequently Mr. Colter was not legally elected" note the great depth of reasoning power displayed. Facts, 12 votes for Colter, 9 votes against—21 the entire Council. Should that not be a sufficient majority, take of the one he finds so much fault with and add it to the nay's, there still is a majority of the Council for Colter. He must have in his mind the past political history when Colter was counted out. It can't be done in this case, one still remains and that one is the Warden who he tries so hard to belittle. Justice again on the County printing, this too was illegal, Saul's tender \$118, the other two together \$150, subtract and you have \$32 not \$50. Now I do not believe this \$32 lost it will be all required to pay outside advertising such as High School Examinations Courts, etc., say nothing of the double publication. Now Mr. Editor I should close, but should I be able by this means to give your neighbor town Reeve some useful information that will keep him out of trouble and so open the eyes of Justice that he too may become less of a crank. Then you should pardon me, why, Mr. Editor did you take in all of Justice's expressions. "Shamefully, dishonest, monstrosity, unjust, illegally, equivocal, defrauded, disgust, ashamed, guilty." Why don't he swear these expressions are to tame, for a brain of his caliber. Swearing comes in here Justice, it would be no sin for you, when you are unable to give vent to your feelings with no more becoming language. See, "that such a man as Colter has been chosen to represent the County in parliament in preference to so able and accomplished a man as Dr. Montague" rats; better swear again: Justice may yet live to see a rival to the light of his ambition, in the person of our now M P and legally elected County Clerk and Solicitor: who will be always ready and willing to supply useful knowledge to such as justice on municipal law; and before again racking his brain over the legal and illegal acts of Council it would be well for both he, the new Reeve and the youthful inkling to avail themselves of this opportunity offered thereby save themselves from running in the same rut again.
