The Dunnville Mystery.

DUNNVILLE, Ont., April 5.—Government Detective Murray, of Toronto, yesterday afternoon arrested Joe Clemmo, of Dunnville. He secured his prisoner about two miles out from Essex Center, where he was working in a saw-mill, and landed him in Cayuga jail last night. Mr. Murray came here this morning and this afternoon arrested Sam Smith and has taken him to Cayuga jail. The prisoners are charged with the murder of an unknown man here last November. It is charged that they first robbed the body and then threw it into the canal. There is a great deal of talk about the matter, and if Detective Murray has secured the right parties he deserves a great deal of credit, as most parties here had given up all hope of ever getting a clue to the midnight assassin.

ST. THOMAS, April 6.—Detective Murray is in the city and from him further particulars are gleaned regarding the arrest of Joseph Clemmo and Samuel Smith on a charge of murdering the unknown man found in the canal at Dunnville on November 9th. A woman with whom Smith formerly lived states that she and another woman were accosted by the unknown man and asked to go for a ride on the night of November 1st; that she refused and told Smith of the occurrence and he told her to go on and he would "lay for" the stranger. A few days after this Sam took up with up with another woman and told her one day he was in trouble and had to go to Buffalo. At that time he had considerable money. Previous to that time he didn't have a cent. He, after persuasion, told the woman that on the night of November 1 he met Clemmo and that they made up to rob the stranger, and that Clemmo struck him on the head harder than he had intended, and the blow killed him. They then threw the body in the water and ran away. Mr. J. Upper, of the Victoria hotel, when closing up that night, went out to shut the back gate, and heard a scream as if a man were struck, and then a splash and the sound of feet running away. Mr. Smith has told several persons what her quondam husband told her, but now, being afraid of Smith, flatly denies the story.
