General Boulanger has decided to leave Belgium. He starts for London to-day.

There was serious rioting in Minneapolis Sunday in connection with the street car strike.

Sir Julian Pauncefote, the newly appointed British Minister to Washington, has arrived at New York.

Live stock and perishable goods only will be sent over the Michigan Central through Canada in future.

A New York despatch says: Postmaster H. G. Pearson died at Highwood, N. J., on Saturday morning.

A battle on Sunday between Egyptians and Soudanese, near Suakim, resulted in a victory for the latter.

There is great excitement over the city elections in El Paso, Texas, and an indiscreet word may lead to bloodshed.

The liquidators of the Panama Canal Company have sent an agent to London to contract a loan for the company.

Dawson, Williams & Co., hide and leather dealers of Boston, have assigned. Liabilities, \$200,000; assets \$100,000.

A Washington despatch says that the question of the duty on Canadian cars is likely to be disposed of this week.

Isaac Rich & Co., fish dealers, of Boston, who recently suspended, have assigned. Liabilities, \$350,000; assets, \$200,000.

Minne polis city council has decided that unless all the street cars are running Monday the company's charter will be forfeited.

The British Colonial Office warns emigrants going to Brazil that the prevalence of yellow fever there makes their prospects hopeless.

Eight inches of snow fell Thursday at Veta P. ss. Colorado. There was snow all over Southern Colorado, but it melted rapidly.

On Saturday, at Dunmore, Pa. two little sons of Michael Cunningham, aged 9 and 10 years, were wild p r snips and died in great agony.

The passengers and crew of the Danmark were saved by the steamship Missouri, a new freight vessel running between London and Philadelphia.

Robert S. McCormick, of Chicago, son-in-law of Joseph Medill, of the Chicago Tribune, has been appointed Second Secretary of Legation at London.

Frederick H. McMasters, a New York stenographer found a wad in the corridor of the post office Thursday, containing \$50,375 in bills and certified checks. He returned the property to a bank in Wall street, and was given \$5 for his honesty.

JOHN SCISSORS AT WORK.

FIRE.—A very disastrous fire occurred at the G. T. R. yard early Wednesday morning last. About four o'clock the brigade were alarmed and were quickly upon the spot, but the fire had got much headway in two buildings and the efforts of the Company were devoted to the adjoining building and the overhead bridge, which were saved. The fire originated in the plaster store-house belonging to the Grand River Plaster Co., from some unknown cause, and spread rapidly to Messrs J & E Bixter's grain elevator, which contained nearly eight thousand bushels of grain, principally wheat, which is rendered useless, except for very coarse feed. Scarcely a vestige of either building remains: immense piles of smoking wheat and soaked plaster are the only traces of the two structures. We think the grain was covered by insurance but no policy was held on the elevator. The Plaster Co. were insured, but we do not know the amount.

CONCERT.—The people of Cayuga had the opportunity on Thursday evening of last week of listening to a rich musical treat. The occasion was the concert given by the Cayuga Fire Brigade. The personnel of the programme, including as it did the first talent of the place, as well as a desire to lend the boys of our rapidly improving brigade a helping hand, drew a large and highly intelligent audience together on that evening. To particularize would be more than odious when many did so well. In addition to Miss Martin, Mrs. J. H. Rogers, Mrs. J. D. McLeod, Miss Roberts, Messrs J. H. Stewart, W. A. Rutherford, A. K. Goodman and E. Kinney, who have by previous efforts established musical and literary reputations in the village, there were some who went triumphantly through the ordeal of the first essay upon a public platform in Cayuga. Among these were Miss Cotter, Misses Draper, and Mr. J. Farrell. Mr. J. A. Murphy filled the chair in a very acceptable manner. The thanks of the Company are hereby tendered to the ladies and gentlemen who kindly took part, as well as to the public for their liberal patronage. We think nearly \$40 were realized.
