METHODIST CHURCH.—A District Convention of the members of the Methodist Church—official and non-official—will be held in the Methodist Church, Simcoe, to-morrow, April 25th, for the purpose of discussing the Platform which has been adopted by the General Committee representing the Laymen of the Guelph, London and Niagara Conferences; and also for the consideration of such other questions as may affect the rights and privileges of Laymen, and their relation to the Church in her various Courts and Conferences. The Platform above named is as follows:—1. That the Stationing Committee be composed of Ministers and Laymen in equal numbers. 2. That all Conference Committees and Church Courts, including the Conference Special Committee, be composed of Ministers and Laymen in equal numbers. 3. That the right of Quarterly Boards to invite and of Ministers to accept provisionally such invitations be fully recognized, subject in all cases to the final decision of the Stationing Committee and the Conference. 4. That Ministers and accredited Representatives of Quarterly Boards shall have the right to a personal hearing before the Stationing Committee, in reference to their own cases. That appointment or election to office in all our Church Courts, Boards and Committees be by ballot without nomination. The several questions will be introduced by competent speakers. There will be two sessions of the Convention: a preliminary session from 10.30 a.m. till 12 noon, and an afternoon session commencing punctually at 2 o'clock. A large attendance is earnestly desired and ample provision will be made for the entertainment of all who may attend. By order of the Executive Committee. Jonathan Ellis, Convener.
