Quite a number from town took in the Simcoe races on Thursday and Friday.

Two Italians, a grind organ and a monkey struck the town on Wednesday but did not stay long.

A daughter of Mr. John Morrison, Garnet, was buried at the Methodist Church cemetery on Thursday.

Hamilton Summer Carnival will be held from 19th to 23rd August, and promises to be an immense affair.

McCarthy Bros. have purchased another engine and separator, and moved the same to Mr. F. Clark's on Saturday.

Warner Miller, of New York, has been chosen by nineteen leading paper firms to represent them on the World's Fair committee.

The Port Dover correspondent to the British Canadian gives the following:—

On Tuesday last a party of ten gay girls from Jarvis, accompanied by but one lonely escort (who acted as driver), visited Orchard Beach. It was a genuine hen party, and our sympathy for the "rooster" is beyond expression.

By an oversight last week we omitted to notice the successful garden party recently held on the lawn of Mr. F. McFarland, under the auspices of the Flunk Road Methodist church. The Firemen's Band discoursed excellent music. The grounds were nicely illuminated and the attendance was good. The receipts netted a handsome sum.

We are in receipt of The Golden Nine a spicy little paper published at San Pedro, New Mexico; and in looking through its columns we find the following births notice:—Another Jones has struck the camp. Mrs. George Jones brought it in. Big boy baby. "President Jones"—that don't sound bad. We hope he will make it.

Friday night a bold highway robbery was committed near Canfield. John Bird, a farmer, was returning home from Canfield when he was met on the road by two men. One of the men grabbed hold of the horse's head, while the other one jumped into the wagon and pointed a revolver at him. The revolver went off and the powder burnt Bird's face, but the bullet missed him. The men went through his pockets and took all the money he had. Then they ejected him from the rig and drove away with the horse and buggy.

The trial of Charles Stewart on the charge of robbing the cash drawer of the London Loan Company of \$1970 took place at the London Police Court Tuesday. The main point in the evidence turned on the question of identity.

Mr. F. Nelles, the cashier, Mr. J. Shillington, the ledger-keeper, Mrs. Anne Jane Fisher identified the accused as one of the men who had visited the office on the day the robbery took place, while Jas. O'Hagan, who knew Stewart in Detroit and Windsor, testified to having seen him in the city on the night before the robbery. For the defence J. W. Martin, Wm. Beattie, Henry Almas and D. J. Fynch, respectable residents of Hagersville and vicinity, swore that Stewart was at home on the day in question. The alibi was a good one and the Police Magistrate acquitted the prisoner. —Hagersville News.

HAMILTON PRESBYTERY met in Port Dover on Tuesday of last week and ordained Mr. John Robertson, of Knox College, to the office of the Ministry and inducted him into the pastoral charge of Port Dover and Vittoria. The Rev. John Wells, M. A., the Moderator, presided, and addressed the people. The Rev. J. A. Hamilton addressed the pastor, and the Rev. J. G. Shearer, B.A., preached. Leave was granted the Simcoe people to moderate in a call as soon as ready.

The new system by which registered letters are only sent on trains with mail clerks and postal cars, instead of closed bags, will come into force on August 1. Under this new system there will be a personal responsibility from the posting of the registered letter until its delivery. The mail clerks at the office give a receipt to the sender, and in return get one from the clerk on the train, or forward them in a sealed packet to the postmaster, and get an acknowledgment in return. While this plan may delay the delivery of the registered letters it will provide security for their delivery. This has been in force on the G. T. R. since July 1, and will now become general.

A PRAYER FOR REPORTERS.—The following prayer, delivered recently by the chaplain of the Minnesota legislature, will be of interest:—"And now, Lord, bless the reporters, whose nimble pens catch our every word almost before it is uttered. A MYSTERIOUS DISAPPEARANCE.—Wm. Weir is a well-to-do farmer living about three miles southeast of the village, and is well known to the community. Mr. Weir has a son about seventeen, and one day, some three weeks ago the father and son were working together on the farm, the son being engaged driving a team from one part of the farm to another. All went along well until it was noticed that considerable time had elapsed since the team had last put in an appearance.
