Cayuga.

PRESENTATION - The town hall on Friday evening, Aug. 2, was the scene of an interesting episode, complimentary to the Cayuga fire brigade, creditable to the villagers, and entertaining to the large crowd present. The occasion was the presentation of a very handsome and costly speaking trumpet.

Some time ago a project was set afoot by some ladies having the welfare of the brigade at heart to manifest the high appreciation in which the citizens of the village held our fire boys, as they are commonly called. A generous response to the appeal was made by nearly every person to whom the list was presented, and Friday evening was selected for the presentation.

In answer to a general invitation a large number assembled in the town hall. About half-past eight the firemen, uniformed and in battle array, marched into the hall, headed by their newly elected chief, Mr. Frank Robbettey. Having taken their places in a semi-circle around the stage, Mrs. McFadden and Miss Kate Lawrence, to whom in an especial way the company owe this valuable gift, went forward bearing the trumpet. Miss Kate Highfield read a short and appropriate address, full of words of gratitude and encouragement to the firemen, at the conclusion of which the trumpet was handed over to the chief who, as full of modesty as zeal for the cause, moved, seconded by the lately resigned chief, W. R. McFadden, that Mr. J. A. Murphy, himself an honorary fireman, should take the chair and answer for the brigade. That gentleman spoke of the deep gratitude felt by every member present, and expressed a true sense of the great trouble and energy it must have cost the good ladies who had just left the platform. High and worthy tribute was paid Mr. McFadden for his yeoman services in the past; encouragement was given to the new chief for the favorable auspices under which he commenced his labors and a formal promise was made on the part of the whole brigade to protect the homes of the liberal townspeople. Dr. Camero, Mr. C. W. Colter, and Mr. D. T. Rodgers spoke earnestly and eloquently of the commendable and plucky action of the company for the past couple of years, and predicting for them a more prosperous career in the future. The audience are indebted to the Cayuga brass band for a very superior programme of music. The band, like the brigade, are fast pushing forward to excellence under their new leader, Mr. McCulla. The evening's pleasure was concluded by a torchlight procession headed by the band.

The Royal Templars' annual camp-meeting, which opened at Oakville on Saturday, has been a great success so far.

General Grenfell has been promoted to the full rank of Major-General "for distinguished service in the field."

It is reported that the Russian Government is pressing the regents of Serbia to expel ex-King Milan from that country.

On account of domestic troubles Christian Hardes, a well-to-do German, of Chicago, shot his wife dead on Friday night.

H. M. Britton, general manager of the Rome, Watertown and Ogdensburg railway, died at Oswego on Saturday, aged 58.

A by-law bonusing the Oshawa Railway and Navigation Company to the extent of \$15,000 was carried in Oshawa on Saturday.

Wm. Lowe, formerly of "C" Battery, stationed at Victoria B.C., was drowned on Saturday while bathing in the harbor there.

The steamer North Star, of Buffalo, was seized at Detroit Saturday and libelled for \$187,000 for the sinking of the Steamer Sheffield off White Fish Point last June.

The New York police were especially active in making arrests for violation of the excise law Sunday, and reached a total of 198.

The tug and raft seized at Amherstburg by customs authorities have been released, after depositing \$4,000 export duty and \$100 fine.

An Ottawa despatch says that the grand master of the A.F. and A.M. has issued a mandate prohibiting dancing in the lodge rooms.

The Wisconsin Central train robber has been identified as a notorious woodman named James McCune. He has not been captured, however.
