ITEMS OF INTEREST IN CONDENSED FORM.

A great flow of natural gas has been struck at Toledo.

Four more bodies have been found at Johnstown.

There is an outbreak of typhoid in one section of Chicago.

The mouldeers' strike in Galt is still on with no signs of an early settlement.

The Queen reviewed the German seamen in the grounds at Osborne Thursday.

Hon. Jonathan Bourne died of paralysis on Wednesday night last at New Bedford, Mass.

There were more visitors at the Halifax carnival Thursday than on any previous day.

The Henry Elias brewery in New York has been bought by an English syndicate for \$500,000.

Wm. Rate, an Adelaide farmer, was so badly gored by a bull a week ago that he died Thursday.

A shortage of \$11,503 has been discovered in the books of County Treasurer Steadman, of Vinton, Iowa.

In the French elections 949 Republicans and 489 Conservatives were returned.

Mrs. Maybrick was found guilty in Liverpool Wednesday last and sentenced to death.

Toronto has a mysterious poisoning case. Two arrests have been made for murder.

The constitution adopted by Idaho abolishes polygamy and separates Church and State.

The mountain miners' strike in Pennsylvania has been settled in favor of the miners.

A fatal disease is raging among horses at Montgomery, Ala. It is called albumaria.

Walter S. Davis, of Hamilton, fell dead while watching the races on Wednesday last at Buffalo.

The sixth annual session of the Grand Lodge I. O. O. F. will meet in Winnipeg today.

Archbishop O'Brien handsomely entertained the newspaper men visiting the Halifax carnival Wednesday last.

In a row at Johnstown, Pa. on Monday night Harry Moyer, a carpenter, shot and killed James McCormack.

St. Louis the latest candidate for a World's Fair. A committee was formed there Friday, and a subscription list opened.

The new White Star flyer Teutonic left Queenstown at 2 p. m. Wednesday last, with the intention of breaking the ocean record.

A prominent attorney of Carthage, Mo., named Green, hanged himself the other day on account of financial troubles.

Ontario fresh beef shipped to St. John, N.B., has given great satisfaction, and bids fair to drive out the Chicago article.

The electricians in convention at Niagara Falls, pronounce strongly against electricity as a means of execution of criminals.

At Linneus, Mo., J. S. Howell, the murderer of Mrs. Hall and her three children, has been sentenced to be hanged November 15.

The great strike in the Pennsylvania coke region was made general Wednesday last. All the seventy-six plants and over 14,000 men are idle.

Young Jim Turner was ordered by the Souders-Howard faction of Kentucky to leave the State. He refused and was shot dead.

The steamship Montreal, of the Dominion line, is total wreck at Belle Isle. The passengers and crew are safe, but the cargo of cattle and sheep perished.

The dead bodies of Ollie Jones, his wife and two other persons have been found in western Montana. The killing is a mystery.

An explosion on the new steam yacht belonging to Mr. L. B. Crocker, of Buffalo, Wednesday last resulted in the death of two daughters and a son of the owner, and a carpenter, besides serious injury to Mrs. Crocker and another daughter.

What a Cloudburst Is.

A LAKE OF WATER ACTUALLY SUSPENDED IN MID-AIR.

The phenomena of a cloudburst, which can only occur in a tornado or whirlwind, are not generally understood. The whirl in which it is not a very broad and shallow disk, but a tall, columnar mass of rotating air, similar to that in which the Atlantic waterspout or the pillar-like dust storm of India is generated. While this traveling aerial pillar, perhaps a few hundred yards in diameter, is rapidly gyrating, the centrifugal force, as Prof. Farrel has shown, acts as a barrier to prevent the flow of external air from all sides into its interior, except at and near the base of the pillar. There friction with the earth retards the gyrations and allows the air to rush in below and escape upward through the fine-like interior as powerful ascending currents.

The phenomenon, however, will not be attended by terrific floods unless the atmosphere is densely stored with water vapor, as it was on Tuesday in the Cayadutta valley. When such is the case the violent ascending currents suddenly lift the vapor above the level at which they were previously floating and hurl them aloft into rarefied and cold regions of the atmosphere, where their vapor is instantly condensed into many tons of water. Could the water fall as fast as condensed it would be comparatively harmless. But the continuous uprushing currents support this mass of water at the high level, and as their own vast volumes of vapor are condensed they add to the water already accumulated thousands of feet above the earth's surface—making, so to speak, a lake in high air.

As the whirlwind weakens or passes from beneath this vast body of water, which its ascending currents have generated and upheld in the upper story of the atmosphere, the aqueous mass, no longer supported, drops with ever-increasing gravitational force to the earth. In severe cloudbursts the water does not fall as rain, but in sheets and streams, sometimes unbroken for many seconds. The cloud burst of 1883 at Hollidaysburg, Pa., excavated many holes in the ground, varying from twenty-five to thirty feet in diameter, and from three to six feet deep. In a similar but milder storm which visited Boulogne last May, fissures were cut in the ground eight feet deep and openings cut in the ground large enough to engulf a horse and cart.—New York Herald.

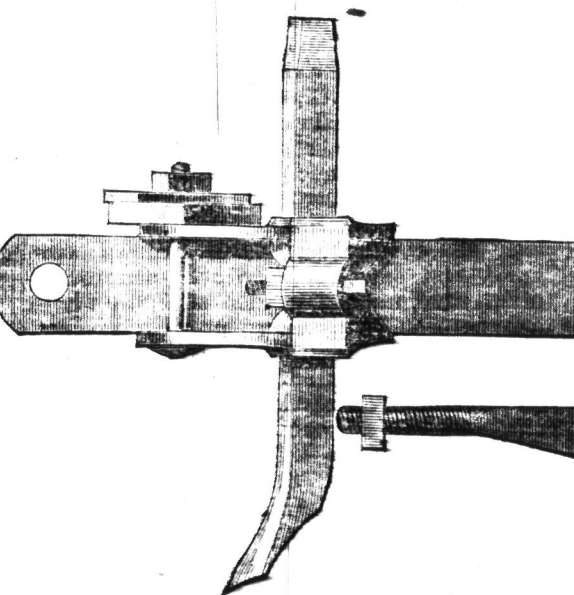
