M. Dumala, husband of Sarah Barnhardt, died in Paris Saturday of cerebral congestion.

Advices from Bosnia report that severe shocks of earthquake have been felt in Jablanica.

T. F. Ellis, the well-known horseman of Niagara Falls, died on Saturday from diabetes.

The pressmen on the New York World went out on strike at one o'clock Saturday morning.

The fishing schooner Mattie Winship has been released on her owners paying the Government \$2,300.

The steamship Norwegian, just reported at Father Point, encountered many icebergs in approaching Belle Isle.

Rev. Dr. McIntyre, of Chicago, preached at Grimsby Park Saturday, and gave the utmost satisfaction to the large congregations.

Eller William Spry, who has been in the vicinity of Chattanooga for more than twelve years working up Mormon converts, has been arrested, charged with bigamy.

The New York Sun says negotiations have just been completed by which the entire breweries of Chicago have been sold to a syndicate of English capitalists.

Statistics just published show that the total number of paupers in England and Wales is 762,553, which allows 26.6 for every 1,000 of the population.

John L. Sullivan was, on Saturday morning, sentenced to twelve months in prison, and Referee Fitzpatrick pleaded guilty and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$300.

Three thousand persons at Portland Me., have signed a petition asking Secretary Blaine to take steps to secure a stay of proceedings in the case of Mrs. Maybrick.

A Philadelphia despatch says a high Papal tribunal is to be constituted in the United States to attend to all cases in which the Church in the United States is concerned.

Ex-Governor John B. Brown, late receiver of the Texas and Pacific railway, and president of the Tennessee Coal and Iron Co., died on Saturday at Red Boiling Springs, Tenn.

Hon. Edward Stanley, Lady Alice Stanley and Hon. George Stanley, children of the Governor-General, accompanied by two servants, arrived in Quebec by the mail steamer on Friday night.

The people of the United States use annually about seven postal cards for every man, woman and child; that is to say, their total consumption for a year reaches 400,000,000.

Charles M. McKertie, a young farmer of Westminster township, shot himself in the presence of his family because his father refused to deed a farm to him. It is thought the young man will die.

A Mexican boy who was bitten by a mad wolf in the San Dias mountains, New Mexico, the other day, died in great agony. He acted like a wolf and though small it took several men to hold him down on his bed.

Arthur C. Chambers, of Boston, left that city a week ago to secure as his wife, Miss Amanda Laidlaw, of Halifax. He stopped to see an uncle in Montreal, took scarlet fever and died. Before dying he made his will, leaving to his intended \$30,000.

The latest report concerning the wheat crop in British India is on the whole more favorable than was anticipated some time ago. It is estimated there will be fair harvest on over sixteen out of twenty-six millions of acres, and something like two-thirds of an average on the rest of the land under cultivation.

The most valuable book in the world is said to be the Hebrew Bible at the Vatican in Rome. In 1512 Pope Julius then in great financial straits, refused to sell it to syndicate of rich Venetian Jews for its weight in gold. The bible weighs more than 325 pounds, and is never carried by less than three men. The price refused by Pope Julius was, therefore, \$125,000, and that, too, when gold was worth at least thrice what it is now worth.

The Hamilton Times flippantly made use of the words "rif-rai" in application to some of the country papers of the Province, and on the assumption that the new sub-editor of the Times, Mr. Carrick, was responsible for the offensive term, the offended papers have come down on him "like a thousand of brick." The Times appears to be standing it pretty well, but it displays a lack of judgement in intimating that these same country papers "are edited with a shovel." If circumstances are considered, there are only a few country papers that do not display more newspapers enterprise and ability than the metropolitan ones.—Clinton New Era.

Private Hill, of the West Riding Regiment at Halifax, put the muzzle of his rifle in his mouth, worked the trigger with his foot and blew the top of his head off because his girl in England jilted him.

Geo. Morley, a brakeman on the Western Division of the G. T. R., while unloading freight at Copetown Friday, was badly squeezed by a box falling on his chest. He was brought to Hamilton where his injuries were attended to by Dr. Mackelton. He will be laid up for a few days.

Sermit is exercised over the building of its new High School. The Board of Education asked for \$26,000 to go on with the construction, and the majority of the Council voted to refuse them the money. It, however, takes a two-thirds majority of the Council to defeat any request made by the School Board, and as six voted for and only nine against the by-law, the town has to pay the \$26,000. School Boards are about as autocratic institutions as we have in Canada.

The Canadian Manufacturer expresses the opinion that the attention of Canadian farmer should be given to the cultivation of flax, for which the soil and climate are well adapted. Though the industry has hitherto been almost wholly neglected in the Dominion, there is no reason, according to our contemporary, why it should not be grown with us as successfully as in Ireland, Russia and Germany. It could always be counted upon as a sure crop, which would produce an average of about fifteen bushels of seed per acre, worth \$1 per bushel, besides two tons and a half of flax straw, worth \$20 a ton, from which could be produced 1,000 lbs. of flax fibre, worth \$200 a ton. This is certainly a matter worthy of careful consideration.
