At a meeting of the Air Line employees held in St. Thomas, it was decided to hold the annual picnic at Port Dover on the 24th August. "Port Dover will give the employees a cash bonus of \$50, the use of the park, hot and cold water, lumber for seats, tables, etc., and the use of the dancing sheds free, while the proprietor of the hotel gives 55 per cent. of the net proceeds."

The return match between the Jarvis and Hagersville Junior Cricket clubs was played at Hagersville on Tuesday last, and resulted in a defeat for our boys by 37 runs.
