A General Epitome of Events of the Week.

ITEMS OF INTEREST IN CONDENSED FORM.

Minards' Lintiment Cures Diphtheria. Bloody affrays are still reported in Crete.

The erection of the scaffold for Mrs. Maybrick has been begun.

A rich bed of yellow ochre has been discovered near Ripley, Tenn.

Mrs. Maybrick's sentence has been commuted to penal servitude for life.

Terrific gales prevail on the English coast, and much damage has been done.

Cobourg's civic tournament opened Wednesday most successfully.

The Montreal Press Club is five months old, and has 60 members.

Sir Leonard Tilley is the guest of Sir John Macdonald at River du Loup.

The rate of taxation in Galt this year is slightly over 20 mills on the dollar.

Over six thousand persons attended the civic tournament in Cobourg Thursday.

The Wauregan cotton goods mills at Providence, R.I., have suspended payment.

It is estimated that 30,000 strangers visited Hamilton's great carnival Wednesday.

A San Francisco despatch tells of an Indian, known as Old Gabriel, who is 150 years old.

A severe hailstorm passed over parts of Austin Wednesday. Many persons were killed.

The steamer Bohemian, which went ashore in the St. Lawrence, near Stanley Island, has been flibuted.

Bud Rensud has been fined \$500 for participating in the Sullivan-Kilrain fight.

It is reported from London that Mr. Parnell will shortly make a tour of America for his health.

Adams A. Gray, a well-known member of the New York Produce Exchange, died Thursday of cancer.

The promoters of the North American Salt Company propose to make another effort to interest investors.

Governor Lowry says there is no foundation for the report that he will commute Sullivan's sentence.

A wholesale distribution of justice takes place in New York this morning, when five murderers will be hanged.

The crowds at the Hamilton carnival Thursday were enormous, and the proceedings passed off in a most satisfactory manner.

The U. S. Revenue Cutter Rush has seized two more sealing schooners, and there is a renewed outburst of indignation at Victoria, B.C.

Miss Kittie Cronyn, daughter of Mr. V. Cronyn, of London, was married Wednesday to Mr. Geo. W. Brown, of that city.

Frederick, N.B., is excited over the announcement that Simmons & Burpee, bridge builders and mill owners, have assigned.

Horace Seaver, editor of the Investigator, a well-known free thought writer and lecturer, died in Boston Wednesday, aged 79.

There is trouble in Montreal between the Road Committee of the city council and the Street Railway Company over the paving between the tracks.

Forty-eight Arabs of both sexes arrived at New York Thursday by the steamer Veendam. Six were allowed to land as they had funds, but the rest were detained.

The crop of corn in the neighborhood of Troy, N.Y., is reported to be light, the potato crop unusually large and dry and oats in abundance, but damage by wet weather.

William Teabrook, a pioneer of Niagara county, N.Y., a well-known hotel-keeper and a prominent mason, died at Olcott Wednesday morning at the age of 77 years.

The main building of the International Fair Association in Buffalo had a narrow escape from fire on Tuesday evening. A hole was burnt in one side of it and repairs will cost about \$2,000.

A RURAL SHERIFF SAT ON.

Mr. R. H. Davis, of Haldimand, in a Hole at Police Headquarters in Toronto.

It was just 15 minutes to 11 Wednesday night when a carriage drove up somewhat rapidly to Police Headquarters. The first one to step out when the vehicle came to a standstill was an old gentleman with a white Christy stiff and generally dignified air. He was quickly followed by a big stout man in a light worsted suit; then came three prisoners, handcuffed and shackled, and lastly, a constable-looking man carrying a valise.

The dignified old gentleman headed the procession as it filed into the station.

"I am Sheriff Rignold Hotspur Davis, of Haldimand," he remarked to Sergeant Somerville, "and I want you to take charge of these men until tomorrow morning."

"You will have to take charge of them yourself," replied the officer. "We have all we can do to attend to ourselves."

"Do you mean that I cannot get room for these men here?" retorted the sheriff, beginning to get angry.

Sergeant Somerville: "What I mean is this. There is the room, but you will take the responsibility of their safe-keeping. If you do not like that you can take your men elsewhere."

The Sheriff: "But I demand accommodation."

Sergeant Somerville: "You can demand all you like, but you will get nothing more."

The Sheriff: "Can I see the rooms?"

The Sergeant consented, and down to the cells marched the rural Sheriff. He came up presently and said the rooms would do, and marched his prisoners into them. He got the privilege of his officer being allowed to stay with them all night. He was about to depart when Inspector Stephen happened in and to him the Haldimand Sheriff poured a terrible attack on the Sergeant.

"I was never so badly treated in my life. I was actually refused accommodation for my prisoners."

Inspector Stephen: "And who told you you could get accommodation here anyhow? The jail is the proper place for such men."

"Yes, but I want to be treated like a gentleman."

"Then behave as such. You come here and demand as a right what is purely optional with us to grant."

"I was never treated so before," bawled out the Sheriff.

"If you are not satisfied take your men out of this. If there has been any trouble it is your own temper that is to blame. The Sergeant was quite right in refusing to be responsible for the prisoners."

This ended the squabble and the rustic Sheriff and his satellites drove in high dudgeon to the Palmer House.

The prisoners were from Cayuga. Two of them, Charles Hall and George Brown, had been sentenced yesterday by Judge Penner to nine years in the Kingston Penitentiary for highway robbery, shooting with intent and horse stealing, and the third was Jas. Smith, who was treated to a three years' dose for burglary.

Chief Constable Farrell and County Constable Sheppard, of Haldimand, accompanied the irate sheriff.

Giovanni Morosini was recently asked by a Saratoga clergyman if Jay Gould "keeps the Sabbath." "Of course he does," answered Morosini. "He keeps anything he lays his hands on."

An English correspondent states that during the first five months of 1889 the subscriptions of capital for various business enterprises have exceeded \$500,000,000, which is \$15,000,000 more than in the same period of 1888, and \$140,000,000 more than in the corresponding period of 1887. Railway construction, largely in North and South America, has absorbed over \$50,000,000 of this year's investments. It will thus be seen that the heavy British investments in industrial enterprises on this continent are not lessening their subscriptions to American railroad projects, in which a vast foreign capital is already permanently invested.

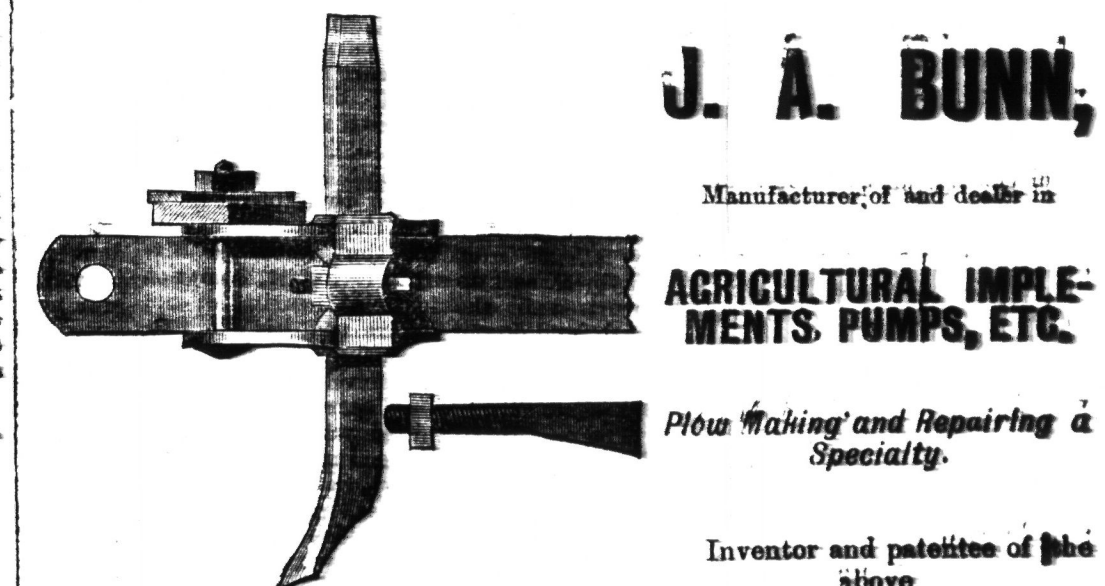
