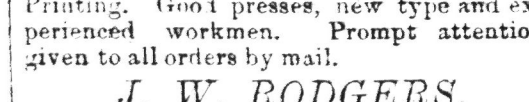

CURRENT NOTES.

The British trade returns show that for the ten months ending October 31st Canada sent \$75,000 cwt. of wheat to Britain as compared with 1,100,000 in 1888 and 3,500,000 in the last year 1887. There has been a large falling off, too, in the receipts from the United States. Our flour exports show a slight increase.

The number of immigrant arrivals in the United States during the first ten months of the present year was nearly 100,000 less than that for the corresponding period last year, and yet it reached the large total of 378,110. There was a falling off of nearly one-half in Italian immigration, for which South America is just now an attractive field.

Mr. C. C. Colby, M. P. for Stanstead, Que., who has been Deputy Speaker in the House of Commons for several sessions, has been prevailed upon to join the Dominion Cabinet, in succession to the late Hon. Mr. Pope. He will be President of the Council, and Sir John Macdonald will continue Minister of Railways.

Dr. Daniel Dorchester, the United States Inspector of Indian Schools, who has been making a tour of the reservation west of the Rocky Mountains, expresses the opinion that the Indians of Washington have a higher average intelligence and more self-reliance than the Indians of the East. He attributes this superiority to the circumstances that the Western Indians have never been pestered by rations or annuities.

According to the returns of the British Board of Trade, the number of persons of British origin who emigrated from the United Kingdom during the ten months ended 31st October last was 233,880, against 255,586 during the corresponding period of 1888. Of these 158,000 went to the United States, 27,500 to Canada, and nearly 24,000 to Australia. While the United States got two-thirds of the whole emigration, they got a still larger proportion of the Irish emigration, 55,333 out of 62,045 Irishmen going to our neighbors. The emigration to Canada was as follows:—21,808 English, 3,585 Scotch and 2,107 Irish.

The City of London has been presented by Sir Sidney Waterlow with a park of 29 acres and \$90,000 to clear off some givens. The park is described by the giver, with pardonable pride, as undulating grounds, well timbered with oaks, old cedars of Lebanon and many other well-grown trees and shrubs, and containing an acre and a half of ornamental water supplied from natural springs. Sir Sidney has been Lord Mayor of London, and another point of resemblance between him and the illustrious Whittington is that he was once a London apprentice. The gift of the park is one of the many evidences that he has not forgotten his fellow-workmen and the city in which he won wealth and honor. He was an active promoter of schemes for the erection of artisan's dwellings, and he gave a fine mansion, rent free, for seven years for the purposes of a Convalescent Home.

It may seem odd, but not very many years ago a man could not be legally punished for stealing a dog in Pennsylvania, for the law of that State, following the old English common law, did not regard that animal as property. In fact the Supreme Court decided that to accuse a man of stealing a dog was not libellous. In 1854 the State Legislature attempted to raise the statute of

the canine race within its jurisdiction by enacting that dogs which were properly registered should be regarded as personal property and therefore capable of being stolen. This law, however, applied to only a few counties, and even in these only very valuable dogs were registered. But this year the Legislature came to the rescue of dog owners by enacting that "all dogs in this commonwealth shall hereafter be personal property and subject of larceny." The Pennsylvania dog, therefore, at last occupies the same footing as his kind in other States.

A CURIOUS case has lately been causing great excitement in Scotland. A shocking murder was committed in the course of the summer in the Isle of Arran. The supposed murderer was recently tried in Edinburgh, and though all the jury were convinced that he was guilty, yet the verdict that effect was carried, as is allowed in Scotland, by the majority vote of only eight to seven. The seven had such a dislike to circumstantial evidence and capital punishment that they voted not proven, though, had the penalty been less than death, it is thought the verdict would have been unanimous. There is a moral certainty that this convict is rightly sentenced, yet petitions for reprieve are being signed by thousands. It is not likely that such a reprieve will be granted, but the contrast between this case and that which interests the people of Ontario is very striking. Every one can draw his own conclusions. The Scotch murderer, according to his sentence, dies on Saturday, the 30th. Nobody doubts about his sanity and few believe in his innocence. In the Harvey case it is just the reverse. —Globe.

The Nick in the Lapel.

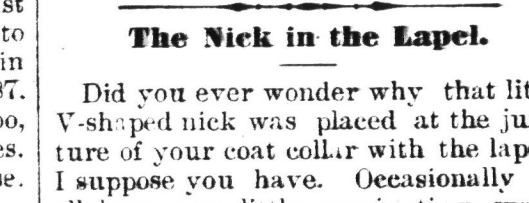

Carefully note the outlines of the first coat-front you see that is well-fitted and buttoned, and see if you cannot plainly detect the initial letter M in its windings. The M will appear upside down, the little nick forming its sides. M was the initial letter for Moreau, and his champions were known by the nick in the lapels of their coats. —St. Louis Republic.

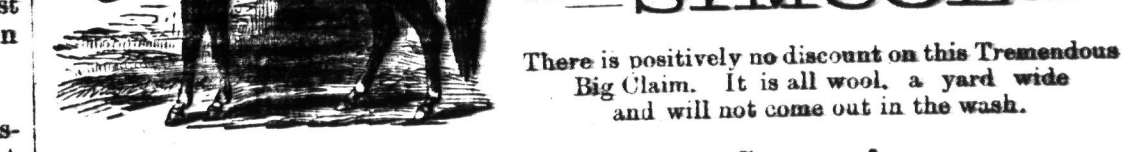
