CURRENT NOTES.

A vegetable cartridge shell, which is entirely consumed in firing, has been brought out in France. The cartridge has scarcely half the weight of one with a metal shell, the cost is considerably less, and the inconvenience of removing the shell after each shot is avoided.

The abundance of remains of the mammoth is almost incredible. Midendorf reckoned that at least 100 pairs of tusks had been put upon the market yearly during the last two centuries, and from personal observation Nordenskjöld is inclined to regard the estimate as too small. It thus appears that in the recent modern trade the tusks of more than 20,000 of these animals of past ages have been collected.

The Welland Canal was opened for business sixty years ago last Saturday. It is mentioned by a St. Catharines journal that the first boat to pass through the canal in 1829 was an American schooner, and the indignation was so great in consequence that the vessel was at one time in danger of destruction. It is to be remembered that in 1829 the bitter memories of the war of 1812 were still alive.

The expenditures of the United States Post-Office Department during the last fiscal year exceeded the revenues by \$7,600,000, and in view of this fact Mr. Wanamaker says in his report that the proposed one-cent rate for letter postage cannot be considered at present. The reduction would entail a loss of revenue of about \$15,000,000. The best that the department can do for the people just now is to issue a new postal card of large size, which will be done shortly.

Notwithstanding all that has been written and said of the evils of cigarette-smoking the habit appears to be growing rapidly in the United States. According to the recently published report of the Commissioners of Internal Revenue nearly 289,000,000 more cigarettes were made in the country during the last fiscal year than the previous one, the whole number being 2,151,515,360. The manufacture of cigars reached the enormous total of 3,867,385,640. Uncle Sam annually puts an immense sum of money into smoke.

The first agricultural experiment station, according to Prof. W. O. Atwater of the United States Department of Agriculture, was established at a little German village near Leipzig in 1851. In 1856 there were five, in 1861 fifteen, in 1866 thirty, and to-day there are more than one hundred experiment stations and kindred institutions in the countries of Europe. The first agricultural experiment station in America was established at Middletown, Ct., in 1835. There were four in operation in 1880, and in 1887 some seventeen in fourteen States. In the latter year Congress made the enterprise national by an appropriation of \$15,000 per annum to each of the States and Territories having agricultural colleges or departments of colleges. This has led to increased activity and there are now forty-six, or counting branches, fifty-seven, agricultural experiment stations in the United States. To support these forty-six stations, the National and State appropriations for the present year reach about \$720,000, and over 370 trained men are employed.

There are 38,000 persons suffering from influenza in St. Petersburg. The malady affects the people more or less in all towns in Russia.

The Farmer Signed His Name.

Some days ago a stranger arrived at Noah Zavitz's place, Yarmouth township, county Middlesex, and proceeded to show his wire clothes-line. Zavitz said he did not want any, but the agent said he was going to string some at his place anyway, so that the neighboring farmers could come around and see for themselves. After stringing the wire the agent presented a paper for Zavitz to sign, stating that it was a certificate that the wire was strung on his premises. Zavitz signed this paper and three days after another man came along with some 3,000 feet of clothes-line, which he said Zavitz had ordered. Zavitz protested that he had not ordered the wire and would not pay for it, but the second stranger said he had and he would leave the wire and make him pay for it, producing an order which Zavitz had signed, agreeing to purchase 3,000 feet of wire per month for twelve months at 5 cents per foot, or \$1,500 for the whole order. The wire is said to be worth about a quarter of a cent per foot. Zavitz consulted a solicitor, who advised him to fight the claim but he evidently thought the easiest way was the best and settled the claim with the wire men by paying them \$135 in hard cash.—Stratford Times.
