CURRENT NOTES.

The Superintendent of the Savings Bank Branch of the Dominion Post Office announces that the Department of Justice has decided that under the special circumstances of losses arising out of the frauds committed by the late Assistant Postmaster Burns, of Kingston, should be made good to the depositors.

Another English syndicate has been formed for the purpose of investing money in the United States. It has a capital of \$100,000,000, and is backed by some of the strongest banking and business concerns in the United Kingdom. Its object will be the development of railway enterprises and industries in general across the border, especially those which have to do with the mineral resources of the country. Is it not strange that so little of the English capital which is flowing into America seeks investment in Canada?

Halifax has a curious law. It is a compulsory Education act, under the terms of which every child between the ages of 8 and 14 years must attend school during the regular school hours every day for at least six months in each year. One of the clauses of the Act reads: "The board shall ascertain before the first day of November in each year the names and ages of all children residing in the city between the ages of eight and fourteen years, and the names of their parents or guardians or persons having charge of them, and carefully preserve lists of the same." In compliance with this, six of the city police were appointed to go through the city and make a record of the children. These enumerators began their work on the 5th November and finished on the 26th. The result is said to be satisfactory. Hunting up scholars with the aid of the police is a new way of filling the schools. Here we can hardly find accommodation for voluntary pupils.

Shall we dance? This is one of the questions now agitating the usually untroubled city of Hamilton. There are two lovely events on the tapis—fashionable balls to which the first families will give their countenances and lend their presence. In anticipation of these festive gatherings the evangelists, Messrs. Crossley and Hunter, have pronounced against dancing, while one of them has gone so far as to reflect upon the respectability of ladies who attend balls. One of the evangelists in a recent address asked the question, "Will dancers get into heaven?" to which he replied, "Yes, they may get in with the idiots." The propriety of dancing is a subject almost as old as the hills. It was discussed before the evangelists who have just led Hamilton by the ears were heard of. We shall never have unanimity on the question. Many religious people will abstain from the dance; and many, who are equally sincere, will join in it, holding that it is a harmless recreation. The fact is dancing is just what it is made to be by those who participate in it. It is to be hoped the exercise is not so displeasing above as the evangelists suppose: because if dancers are to be condemned David will be missed.—Toronto Mail.

Hardwood in Ontario.

To the Editor of the Jarvis Record:

Sir.—The possible scarcity of that great requisite to the rural Canadian, hardwood for fuel, leads me to suggest that the ideas usually held as to the quantity within our reach are exaggerated. I see in a late article, the Bohemian Independent, a paper which should be well informed on such subjects, says:—

"What about our cordwood? That is a very important matter, the sources of our cordwood becomes fewer and more remote. There is not so much cordwood left in Canada as is commonly supposed. Of the thousands of miles of railway operated by the Grand Trunk Company the Midland is the only division that runs through a cordwood country, and only a portion of that division can supply fuel in considerable quantities. The City of Montreal last week went up 50 cents, real is selling at \$8 a cord, birch at \$7.50 and beech at \$7. A large dealer has publicly declared that there is no cordwood to be bought throughout the country. Toronto has for its chief sources of supply the Victoria branch of the Midland, the district around Penetang and the new extensions of the Northern railway. Two or three years will make a great reduction in those sources of supply and then there will be the same condition of affairs in Toronto that now exists in Montreal. There are several facts connected with the cordwood, let us say on the Victoria branch, obtains \$2.00 is merely the value of the labor expended in cutting the wood and hauling it to the line, the wood itself counts for nothing, the man who cuts it giving the wood gratis. When the wood reaches Toronto it sells for \$5 a cord and the \$3 being consumed in freight and profit to the dealer. This is a subject upon which Toronto citizens would do well to reflect. The wood difficulty is becoming serious."

It would be well if those who are selling their wood as above would consider this. We should be planting instead of cutting so much down without any replacement.
