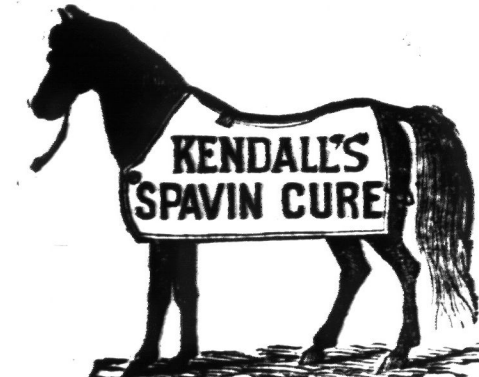

Manitoulin Island.

To the Editor of the JARVIS RECORD:

When I wrote you last I promised to send some specimens of grain in the straw for the inspection of Walpole farmers. Why I failed to do so I will briefly explain. On three different occasions I had aside samples of fall wheat, spring wheat, oats and barley, from four to five feet in length. Unfortunately all of these were destroyed by the mice and chickens before I was ready to send them away. The grain was, however, not as plump as in some former years owing to the unusual warm rainy weather and some fields of spring wheat yielded rather poorly to the straw though a good average per acre.

As many friends have been kind enough to suggest that I should say more as regards our personal welfare. I might say that our large family are in the best state of health and spirits. We have found Manitoulin Island as healthy as represented. We have also found it a land of "peace and plenty." We threshed at one barn 1029 bushels of grain, 450 bushels of which is peas grown from 25 bushels of seed. We have another barn yet to thresh which will likely add 250 bushels more of fall and spring wheat. We could get 40 cents cash for peas at Providence Bay during navigation. But there will be no demand now for grain till towards spring when oats will be in brisk demand.

Our home and surroundings are still of a rough back woods character. A smoke house stands near filled with choice white fish and herring. Plenty of porkers in three different pens with other blessings remind us that we can compare favorably with Dakota, at least where many are reported as being in absolute want.

A herd of Caribou as well as some red deer have frequented the neighborhood of Providence Bay but thus far I have had no time to hunt for them and have only got another common fox and a few partridge. There are thousands of large white rabbits and our boys have some sport snaring them.

I have forgotten whether I reported last year that in this township but as bear adventures are common events here it is perhaps immaterial.

Miss Anna Raekie, the young lady from Collingwood of whom I spoke in my last letter as engaged to teach our school, has had some rare sport with the trawling line in our lake. Besides being a good teacher she is proving quite an acceptable addition to society here and seems to feel quite at home. She possesses with the aid of other young people having a grand school entertainment during the holidays.

Your correspondent has been kindly invited to reside at a tea-meeting to be held at Providence Bay on Christmas eve in aid of the funds of a new Presbyterian church now being erected east of Lake Manitoulin.

Our winter weather which usually came on so steady and gradual was ushered in this year by a furious snow storm, almost a blizzard in fact about the 1st of November, but at this date we have very mild weather again with the snow nearly all gone.

Wishing one and all a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

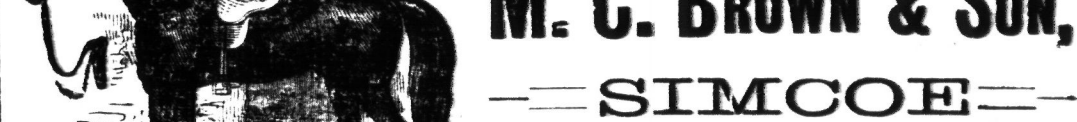
