There are terrible destitution in the Shamokin, Pa., district owing to several mines having been closed, and thousands of miners and their families are on the verge of starvation.

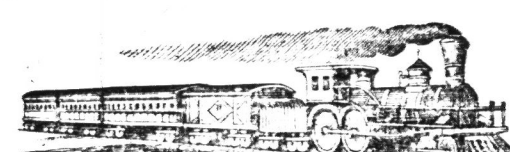
