#### Serious Damages by Lightening and Rain.

Hamilton, July 1.—The thunder, lightening and rain storm of this morning did much damage to the telegraph, telephone and fire alarm systems in this city and vicinity. The frame stable belonging to J. W. Murton & Co., coal dealers, at the foot of John street, was struck by lightning and a portion of the building torn away. One of the most valuable horses in the stable was instantly killed. The residence of Mr. Calder, manager at the reservoir, on the mountain brow, was struck by lightning, one window frame being torn out and other slight damage done. The inmates were badly scared but unhurt. R. M. Wanzer & Co.'s factory on Barton damage done to the machinery Patterstreet were also flooded, the water having burst the sewer in the vicinity,
