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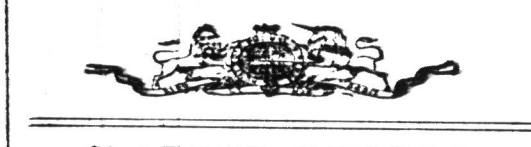

The Synod of Huron passed a resolution denouncing the administration of the school law of Ontario.

A subscription bar is soon to be opened at Berlin, where for \$150, paid in advance, a man can drink all he chooses. The life members will be called barristers.

Chief Justice Sir Thomas Galt has been appointed administrator of the Government of Ontario during the absence of Lieut. Governor Sir Alexander Campbell.

A Michigan girl who wanted a melodeon acquired the necessary sum by raising 350 bushels of onions. Only time will tell whether the peeling of the melodeon will extract more tears than the peeling of the equivalent of onions.

It is believed by the police authorities at Port Huron that the lyncher who hung Martin hung the wrong man. This discovery comes too late to help the dead man, but it should help the police in bringing to trial the dastardly crowd who did the lynching.

One-half of the city of Lachan, in China, was destroyed by the recent fire. The conflagration raged four days. It is now estimated that 1,200 persons were killed. Most of them were crushed in trying to escape from the narrow streets. Ten thousand persons are homeless.

A St. Louis Judge has just sentenced a man to 99 years' imprisonment for murder or manslaughter. As he had been twice before sentenced to be hanged he will probably not be indignant at the needless severity of a sentence which will keep him in goal more than half a century after he is dead.

Dr. L. H. Davidson, chairman of the Citizen's Committee of Montreal, has forwarded a protest to the Government against the reference of the Jesuits' Estates Act to the Supreme Court, which has been asked for by Mr. Hugh Graham. There is some speculation as to which authority the Government must obey.

And now we are told that the duty on slate is villainous because if a poor man wants a slate mantel in his little cabin he has to pay the "tax" on the slate. Get out! Wood mantels are just now the proper paper, and the poor man can get a very nice one, carved in Canadian wood, for a couple of thousand dollars.

A Baltimore lawyer has laid before the State Department the case of a citizen of Hayti who recently entered a drug store in Baltimore, asked for a glass of sodawater and was refused by the clerk. The druggists' lawyer is preparing an elaborate reply, in which he contends that the Haytian winked and that the druggist had done that kind of sodawater in stock.

The Galt "heretics" have been excommunicated from the Presbyterian church we may expect that a new sect will be started to occupy additional property free from taxes and to send more missionaries to mix up the intellects of the heathen who are even now astonished at the many different ways by which Christians go to heaven. Thus, one by one, the long-felt wants are filled.—Hamilton Spectator.

Visitors to the Paris Exhibition may get a pretty fair idea of how our earth looks to the residents of the nearest planet. Paris occupies about a third of an inch. All the great lines of communication by land and sea are shown in detail. The earth's daily rotation will be precisely imitated by clock-work a point on the globe's equator moving an eightieth of an inch per second.

The Dominion of Canada and most of the Provinces have had Ministers of Agriculture for some time, and the office has proved to be a useful one. The United States got one early this year, and now Great Britain is to have a President of the Board of Agriculture. In this case Canada may claim the credit of setting a good example to her English-speaking relatives.

The Canadian Bank of Commerce, as the report read at the annual meeting of its shareholders shows, is one of Canada's most flourishing financial institutions. Paying its stockholders a seven per cent. dividend, and carrying to the credit side of its profit and loss account a large balance, it has begun another year with brightest prospects, and success is almost certain to reward the efforts of the able financiers at its head.

Belgium is a poor place for physicians. A writer to a medical journal published there says that they have the care of three-fourths of the population, get nothing at all from one-half of their patients and very poor pay from the rest. The salary of the prison surgeons has been reduced to £20. A colliery surgeon writes that in the establishment where he is engaged the physician who prescribes too expensive drugs must pay a part of the expense out of his own pocket. 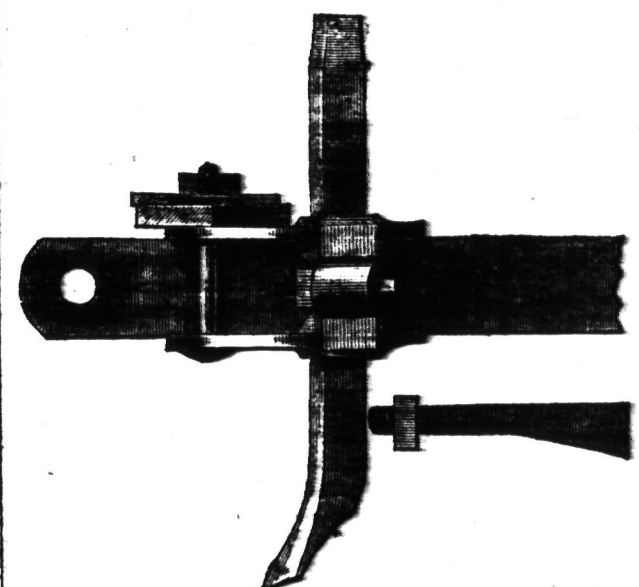
"And you did it?"

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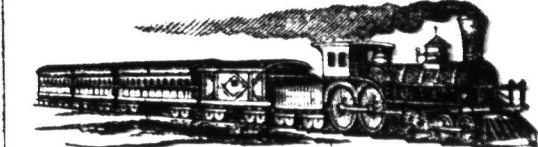
