Cost of Governing Canada
SHE HAS 56 LEGISLATURES MORE THAN THE MOTHER COUNTRY.

Some persons with a state for statistics has been examining the salary list of the Dominion, and finds that the small population of Canada pays enormously to support a cumbersome machine, of which its more liberal people are gradually becoming very weary.

It is often laughingly remarked in England that Canada must have a vast deal of legislation to attend to, since she finds it necessary to have 56 legislatures more than the mother country, and so many departmental heads that no Canadian outside of politics can tell their number.

The Canadian Commons consists of 215 members, who draw \$1,000 each session, and the Senate, which has little to do except to look wise, has 50 members, who receive \$1,000 each annually.

The Speakers of each house of this immensely overpaid national Legislature receive \$8,000 annually; the Ontario members and Speakers, \$56,800; the Quebec Legislative Council, Legislature and the two Speakers, \$75,000. Then the country is saddled with a Governor General, who receives nearly \$85,000 annually and spends as little as possible in the country, sending to England for even the smallest articles of daily wear and consumption.

His chief business seems to be not to comply with the wishes of the people whenever he has a chance to show his authority. There are also Lieutenant Governors of Quebec and Ontario and Manitoba, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, the North-west Territory, and Prince Edward Island, each of whom receives a larger salary than is given chief justice of the Supreme Court of the United States. And as a fringe around this circle of costly officials, many of whom are utterly useless, there is a small army of paid aides-de-camp, secretaries, etc., who have abundant perquisites. The idea of a country like the Dominion having 47 political "ministers" is certainly somewhat absurd.—Utica Globe.

A London despatch says the crops in the United Kingdom promise favorably.
Wilkie Collins has been stricken with paralysis, and his recovery is doubtful.
George A. Barker, the recently elected Mayor of St. John, N.B., died on Saturday.

At Crow Creek Agency, Southern Dakota, on Saturday the thermometer registered 110 in the shade.
It is now estimated that 150 people were injured during the celebration of the 4th at Oklahama, I. T.

Mr. Leonard, the well-known contractor, of St. Catharines, fell dead on the street there last Sunday evening.
The shoe listers' strike at North Adams, Mass., has been settled until April 1, 1890, in favor of the men.

W. C. Jones, editor of the Paris Star-Transcript, died suddenly on Saturday morning from apoplexy.
The German strikes are waning, starvation forcing the strikers to yield. The better class of men continue to emigrate.

At St. Louis, Mo., on Friday night, Chas. Eggers, a brewer, committed suicide by hanging. Cause, domestic troubles.

Mr. Henry Van der Smissen, father of Prof. Van der Smissen, of Toronto University, died in Toronto Sunday evening.
Mr. Moreau, chief engineer of the ocean mail steam tender Contest, was drowned on Saturday by falling off the Rimouski pier.

The French Senate Committee which had the matter in charge has approved the bill for the relief of the Panama Canal Company.
The Duluth strikers engaged in a riot on Saturday and the militia were called out. Two men were killed and over thirty wounded.

The coroner's jury at Johnstown have given a verdict holding the owners of the South Forks dam responsible for the calamity.
It is stated in Chicago that between twenty and thirty members of Clan-na-Gael Camp, No. 20, are members of the Chicago police force.

A 15-year-old boy named Russell had his brains blown out on Saturday at Warkworth, Ont., by the explosion of a gun while shooting crows.
Fernando Wood, a grandson of the late Fernando Wood, who was employed as assistant engineer of the Nicaragua canal, has drowned in Nicaragua.

A St. Thomas man named John Ketchum, who served in an Iowa regiment during the American war, is to be paid \$9,088 arrearages of pension and \$12 per month during life.

The marriage of Princess Louise of Wales and the Earl of Fife will take place July 27 in the chapel of Buckingham Palace. The Queen and probably the Shah will be present.

ENCOURAGING SCIENCE.—The Vermont Microscopical Association has just announced that a prize of \$250, given by the Wells & Richardson Co., the well-known chemist, will be paid to the discoverer of a new disease germ. The wonderful discovery by Prof. Koch of the cholera germ, as the cause of cholera, stimulated great research throughout the world and it is believed this liberal prize, offered by a house of such standing, will greatly assist in the detection of micro-organisms that are the direct cause of disease and death. An Underground Canal.

The strangest canal in the world is a canal 16 miles long, between Worsley and St. Helens, in the north of England, and is underground from end to end. In Lancashire the coal mines are very extensive, half the county being undermined, and many years ago Duke of Bridgewater's managers thought they could save money by transporting the coal underground instead of on the surface. So the canal was constructed, the mines connected and drained at the same time. Ordinary canal boats are used, but the power is furnished by men. On the roof of the tunnel-arch are cross-pieces, and the men who do the work of propulsion lie on their feet against the cross-bars on the roof. Six or eight men will draw a train of four or five boats, and as there are two divisions in the tunnel boats pass each other without difficulty.

The London and Continental money markets report a quiet week, with Russian securities especially heavy at Berlin.
