The garden party held on the lawn of Mr. Robert Evans, Nanticoke, on Friday evening was a grand success. Gate receipts amounting to \$66.50.

The Hon. John Norquay, of Winnipeg died on Saturday, the funeral took place on Monday, and was the largest and most imposing ever witnessed in the Province.

A Hagersville syndicate has purchased the Agricultural grounds at that place and will put down a full half mile track at once on it. The Agricultural Society will remain in possession of the grounds for three days each year.

The stage mail service between Simcoe and Port Rowan was superseded on the 1st of July by mail service on the South Norfolk Railway.

### A Terrific Blaze in Simcoe.

On Saturday morning about two o'clock one of the most disastrous fires that ever occurred in Simcoe broke out in the stable and barn of ex-Mayor Hayes, situated immediately behind the Bittersby house, midway between Kent and Norfolk streets. From buildings were on all sides, and the fire spread with lightning-like rapidity in all directions. Dr Hayes' stable was burned, together with a valuable mare, cutters, robes, hay, etc. The dwelling-house and barn of Archie Hillier, owned by Dr. Hayes, also the brick building, stables and the American Hotel its. If were totally destroyed. By the prompt and heroic efforts of the firemen the buildings on Robinson street were saved, through much damage in the rear. At one time the fine business establishment of George J. McKee, the largest dealer in town, was in eminent danger, but was saved. The Bittersby house is seriously damaged in the rear, also the photograph gallery of C. Arthur. The pork-packing establishment of Marshall Brothers, Frank Stevenson's tailor shop, McIntosh's barber shop, Stroud's billiard parlor, Charles Misner's bakery, Mathers' tailor shop and Steele's harness shop were all more or less damaged. The losses, as far as can be ascertained at present is about \$80,000. Insurance on McQueen's hotel, \$2,500; Stevenson, \$250; Misner, \$750; Arthur, on buildings, \$2,000; Marshall Bros., \$2,100; Dr Hayes, partially insured. The fire is believed to have been the of an incendiary, and much excitement prevails. Only one of the two Waterous engines recently purchased has been delivered. That one was promptly out and did good service under adverse circumstances.
