## Sunstroke.

Mr. William James Nelles, son of the late James C. Nelles, received a sunstroke while at his uncle's. Mr. Norris Humphrey's on Monday afternoon, from which he died at half-past one the same night. He had been working in the hay field all morning and about two hours during the afternoon, when he complained of feeling sick, and stopped. After eating a hearty supper he went out to the field again and helped to load hay, but was not able to finish the load, and his uncle told him to go to the house, as he was looking bad, and complained of pains in his head. After the others had got the hay unloaded they found the deceased sitting on a pile, which was turned bottom up, at the end of the barn, with his eyes shut, and insensible. He was immediately taken to the house, and the doctor sent for, but the young man never spoke afterwards, but passed away quietly at the time mentioned. He was 20 years and 8 months old, and an only and beloved son, his mother and sisters living in Brantford, where they moved from this village about a year since. They arrived during the night, but not until after he had breathed his last. The deceased had been teaching school for the past year at Bell's School House in Glunford, and was spending a few days at his uncle's before going to visit his mother and sisters at Brantford. He partook of sacrament at St. Paul's Church, in this village, on Sunday morning, of which Church he was an ardent member. He was also a member of the Canadian Order of Foresters, in which Lodge he had an insurance of \$1000. The funeral took place from his uncle's residence at one o'clock Wednesday, for the St. John's Church Burying Ground, York. - Sacher.

**BURNED.** - The three-year-old carriage stallion "Moonlight," sold by Scott Bros., of Caledonia, to Mr. Bradshaw of Belleville was burned to death in his stable last week. He was valued at \$1,500 and was a full brother to "Mark Twain" and "Carriveau."

Dr. Gardiner and Mr. W. Old were leading a horse behind a cart on which both were seated, on their way to the Town Hall, Oneida, on Monday morning when the horse, which was a stallion, jumped on top of both men, knocking Mr. Old out of the rig and throwing the Dr. on top of the horse which he was driving, causing it to run away. They all ran into the ditch, and several men being close at hand, caught the horse before he got away and saved the Dr.'s life thereby, as his feet were caught in the sulky and he could not get them out, and if the horse had started the Dr. would have been dashed to pieces. It was a very narrow escape, but the Dr. will not forget it for some time, as his legs are very painful. - Sacher.

**CANADIAN PRESS ASSOCIATION.** - The thirty first annual meeting of the Canadian Press Association will be held at the Rossin House, Toronto, on Thursday, July 18, at 11 o'clock a. m., for the election of officers and transaction of general business in the interests of the association. The annual excursion will follow the meeting. The route will be: Toronto to St. John, N. B., via C.P.R., new short line; home via Intercolonial and G. T. R., calling at the city of Quebec and other points of interest. From St. John there will be side trips to Fredericton and other places, and a visit to Prince Edward Island is also anticipated. The association proceeds to St. John by invitation from the Board of Trade of that city, to participate in the grand summer carnival and electric exhibition in that city.

Mr. Samuel Almas, of Ancaster township, has cut 65 loads of hay off 30 acres.

Quietness prevailed in all the European stock markets last week.

The military council of servia has decided to arm 30,000 men of the third levy.

C. H. Treat & Co., of Wilmington, Del. are said to have failed; liabilities, \$100,000.

O'Conner and Searle signed articles Monday in London to row on September 9.

Mr. Lincoln, the U. S. Minister, and his wife are the guests of the Queen at Windsor.

Near St. Thomas Monday an Indian was so badly gored by a bull that he cannot live.

Justice Falconbridge was the recipient of a pair of white kid gloves at Port Arthur Monday.

The jail at Jacksonville, Oregon, took fire Friday night, and three prisoners were suffocated.

The Empress Augusta Victoria of Germany is said to have joined the Catholic church.

Salem, Mass., has had seventeen cases of diphtheria since July 1, and the scare is increasing.

Another heavy rainstorm swept over parts of Indiana and Illinois on Friday night, doing much damage.

Fishing in the St. Lawrence was never better than it is this season: says a Brockville despatch.

The monument at the grave of Roscoe Conkling, in Fort Hill Cemetery, at Utica, N. Y., is completed.

Trouble is said to be brewing at Oklahoma City, owing to a new crowd of settlers opposing the city administration.

The one hundredth anniversary of the fall of the Bastille was celebrated in Paris Sunday. There was some disorder.

The Ohio Steel Company of Cleveland, Ohio, has been organized into an English company with a capital of \$200,000.

Postmaster Quencer, of Watertown, N. Y., has been found \$200 short his accounts. His bondsmen have paid the amount.

The Burke matter at Winnipeg has been enlarged for two weeks, as there is a prospect that a habeas corpus will be applied for.

A Pittsburg despatch says that the great strike at the Homestead Steel Works was virtually settled at a conference held on Saturday.

The Michigan Central has announced its intention to meet the Grand Trunk cut rate of 20 cents on grain, and other roads are expected to follow.

Niagara Falls South is excited over an attempt made on Saturday to steal the body of the whirlpool rapids victim, which was interred in Drummondville cemetery.

Thomas Johnson, colored, who is in Sandwich jail awaiting trial for killing his little stepson, has eaten nothing since last Tuesday week, and proposes to starve himself to death.

Dr. Wm. P. White, a Boston physician, aged 60, during a quarrel with his young wife on Saturday, stabbed and instantly killed her. He then committed suicide by shooting himself.

At Buffalo Sunday Newton Slich, employed by the Pullman Palace Car Company, in cleaning out cars was stricken with small-pox and removed to the pest-house. It is thought he contracted the disease while cleaning the cars.

Neil Gilchrist, a farmer of Heartley, while going home from the Orange demonstration at Lindsay on Friday night, was thrown violently against a fence by his team running away, and had several ribs broken and an arm fractured in two places.

Kilrain and Murphy reached Chicago Sunday morning in a bedraggled condition, leaving Pony Moore in the woods. They went to the residence of Parson Davies, who fixed them up, loaned them \$100 and sent them east. They are said to be making for Toronto.

The Carl Rosa Opera Company has paid an eight per cent. dividend for the last half year in London. The most profitable production was "Paul Jones," at the Prince of Wales' Theatre, where Agnes Huntington has sung and acted her way into the good graces of London.
