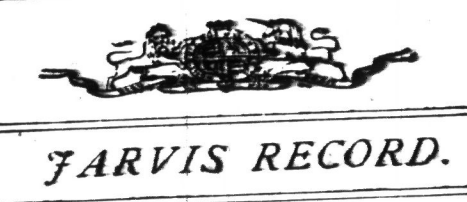

In high lands there is every prospect of a bountiful yield of wheat. Root crops have suffered most, particularly potatoes. Fair weather between now and harvest will retrieve much of the damage done.
