The French Government has given a final refusal to assent to the Egyptian conversion scheme.

The steamer Zealandia, just arrived at Auckland, N.Z., from Honolulu, reports all quiet in Samoa.

The Kanawha valley in West Virginia has been deluged, and a number of lives are reported lost.

Hon. T. B. Pardee, late Minister of Crown Lands for Ontario, died Sunday at his home in Sarnia.

The issue of Panama canal bonds to the amount of \$,925,000 francs at 105 has been fixed for July 27.

Burglars on Friday night stole \$12,000 worth of jewellery from H. J. Bodwell's store at Lynn, Mass.

Grand Duke Constantine, uncle of the Czar, has suffered a stroke of paralysis. He has lost the power of speech.

The Baltimore Corn and Flour Exchange protests against the restoration of 25 cent rate on wheat from Chicago.

W. P. Prower has again been selected to contest West Durham for the Local House in the Conservative interest.

Billy Pease, a notorious crackman, has escaped from jail at Bennington, Vermont. He was awaiting trial for burglary.

The Boulangists in Marseilles have decided to nominate General Boulanger as a candidate in four cantons for the Councils General.

The Porte will send several battalions of troops to the Island of Brete in consequence of the threatened rising of the people there.

Business on the London Stock Exchange was dull last week, and the Continental money markets were quiet, but prices were maintained.

Senator Sherman, who is in Paris, approves the re-nomination of Governor Foraker of Ohio, and intends to come home at once to stump for him.

It is reported that the arming of the Serbian reserves is due to a fear on the part of the Government that the regular troops are loyal to ex-King Milan.

Miss Bertha Head and Richard Lyman, members of leading families at Kenosha, Wis., were drowned in Lake Michigan by the upsetting of a skiff Friday evening.

A first-class prevaricator telegraphs from Grafton, Dak., to Chicago saying that the crops in the Canadian North-west and that the farmers are almost destitute.

The Barley Harvest.

Mr. Robert H. Lawder makes the following suggestions to farmers: During the past season several malsters and brewers in different parts of the United States complained of the malting quality of a large proportion of the barley crop of Ontario of last year. They think that most of it was cut too green, and much of it was threshed too close, so that a large number of grains were broken, and the germinating property of others was injured. Most of the malsters in Toronto report that they have had the same fault to find with much of the barley, especially that which they received by cars. Some seem to think that the closeness with which the sheaves are now bound by the self-binding machines requires that the grain should be allowed to mature more thoroughly than formerly.

Even among the German brewers, who a few years ago were willing to pay high premiums for extra bright barley, the general preference now is for plump grain and of good color. It is urged that by allowing the barley to get fully ripe before cutting farmers will gain more in average plumpness of berry and weight per bushel than they are at all likely to lose through deficiency in color. As to split grains, this is a serious objection, not only because of their absolute worthlessness for communicate this mould to the malt around them. Too close threshing should be avoided, and in this way there should be no split grains or damaged ends.

malting, but because of the liability of these grains to become mouldy, and considerable mistrust will be shown towards Canada barley during the coming season, owing to the fear that a good deal of old barley will be mixed with the new. Dealers can do much towards allaying the feeling by satisfying American malsters that they are using proper care in keeping the two kinds apart and shipping them separately.

The Warwick Murder.

LITTLE HOPE THAT MISS MARSHALL'S MURDERER WILL BE ARRESTED.

The Sarnia Observer says: -The story that Albert Wilson, the murderer of Miss Marshall, had been arrested in South America, turns out to be a hoax, Detective Rogers, speaking of the case the other day, expressed very little hope that Wilson would be captured. He says that Wilson had four days start before the Government detectives were put on. A cabinet photograph of the murderer had been given to the girl he killed, but a brother of Wilson's called at Marshall's homestead the day after the tragedy and secured the picture. He went around among the neighbors and collected every one of a dozen photographs the murder had given away to friends in better days. Then the negative was broken before the detective was called in. Without the aid of a photograph detection was impossible, although the fugitive was tracked through Sarnia to Port Huron, and on to a distant point in Michigan, where all trace of him was lost.

LONDON, July 20. -Nineteen factories boarded 3,620 boxes-396 June make; balance first half July. Sales reported, 260 boxes June at 8 1/2c.

MONTREAL July 20. -The exports for the week were 72,500 boxes, of which 28,000 were on through shipment, as against 88,000 for the corresponding week of last year. Orders are said to be upon a basis of 8 1/2c, which is a clear quarter under what holders want.
