Boulingist supporters experienced a check Saturday in the French elections. The fertilizing factory of E. Raub & Sons at Indianapolis has been burned. Loss, \$60,000.
A trust is to be formed New York on August 11 to control the entire Florida orange crop.
Prof. C. W. Oldrewe, of Boston, is reported to have walked on water a distance of five miles.
The Railway Men's Christian Convention is to be held in Halifax, N.S., August 24 to 26.
Mrs. Josie Walters, of Chicago, has been imprisoned for debt, her creditors paying her board.
Dr. Schmelzkopf, surgeon-in-chief of Capt. Wissman's expedition, has been drowned at Zanzibar.

The anniversary of Peruvian independence was celebrated at Lima Sunday with great enthusiasm.
Isaac G. Jenkins, lumber dealer and shingle manufacturer at Oswego and Olean, N.Y., has assigned.

The Belgin Senate has sanctioned the credit asked by the Government for the Congo railway.

The steamer Thetis, sugar laden, from the Philippine islands for Philadelphia, is two weeks overdue.

The cotton spinners at Liverpool have decided to adopt short time for a fortnight, beginning to-day.

Portions of the Austrian empire were terribly devastated by a cyclone Sunday. Many lives were lost.

The C.P.R. employes held their annual picnic at Orangeville on Saturday and it was a most successful affair.

W. J. Ehrlich, senior partner of the New York firm of Ehrlich Brothers, died suddenly Friday night of heart failure.

The negotiations of the English syndicate for the Indianapolis breweries have terminated in a failure to agree on terms.

A true bill has been found against Mrs. Maybrick, who is accused of causing her husband's death at Liverpool by poison.

A Brooklyn paper says an English syndicate has brought out two gas companies in that city and is negotiating for others.

The sewer pipe trust at Pittsburg has gone to pieces. The small dealers underbid the trust. Prices are now lower than ever.

Two hundred people in Wilson county Tenn. have bonded together to drive the Mormon elders and converts from the county.

The sum of \$700,000,000 cash and securities has been transferred from Mr. Hyatt to Mr. Huston at the Washington Treasury Department.

The single tax adherents and the personal friends of Mr. Henry George are preparing to give him a grand reception on his arrival at New York.

The British sealing schooner Black Diamond, was seized in Behring's Sea by the U.S. revenue cutter, Seah, but released after an investigation.

Prof. J. W. Howell, a well-known educator of Rutledge, Tenn., is dying of hydrophobia. He was bitten thirteen years ago by a black-and-tan terrier.

Sir J. R. Somers Vine, of London, England, and Col. Samuel Parker, Prime Minister of the Sandwich Islands, are at the Clifton house, Niagara Falls.

President Corbin, of the Philadelphia and Reading railroad, has a scheme on foot to open a new line for shipment of coal to Canada over the St. Lawrence.

The constitutional convention at Boise City, Idaho, unanimously passed the article on election and suffrage, which is intended as death blow to Mormon political power in Idaho.

The sewer pipe trust at Pittsburg is said to be in difficulty. It has not been able to make any money. Assessments are in order and everybody is trying to get out as nearly whole as possible.

Mrs. Sally H. Thomason, of Chicago Junction, has been taken to the Toledo Insane Asylum. She is a cousin of the late Gen. U. S. Grant. Her affliction was brought about by the death of near and dear relatives.

New Bridge at St. George.

Five new spans have been put in position in the railway bridge near the station. A span was put in on the afternoons of Saturday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. After getting everything in readiness it took only about fifty minutes to put a span in position. While the work was being done, trains going through were held back for a short time at Dumfries' siding. The fifth and last span was put in on Thursday afternoon. The spans look very substantial. They were made by the Hamilton Bridge Company,

are fifty feet long, about seven feet in breadth, and weigh about twenty-two tons. The western part of the bridge is also being made more solid looking. St. George Journal.

A Four-Year-Old Child's Lonely Journey.

PORT HURON, July 19. - Mr. and Mrs. Lincoln of Port Huron went to Central Africa to do missionary work. Mrs. Lincoln soon sickened and died, and Mr. Lincoln started for the coast, hoping to return home. After journeying six weeks he died at the Zulu station and a local missionary who corresponded with Mrs. Lincoln's father, Rev. Israel Mudge of Smith's Creek, determined to send Mr. and Mrs. Lincoln's only child home. So a huge tag was sewed to the clothing of the little 4-year-old orphan, on which were written the necessary directions, and she was started towards America in March last. On Tuesday she reached Port Huron and friends safe and sound, having travelled 6,000 miles alone.
