> A St. Thomas despatch of list Thursday says: The M. C. R. yesterday received the first of the new engines which are to be put in use to haul through passenger trains. The engines have six drive wheels, instead of four, as on the engines now in use on the road, weigh from 25 to 80 tons more than the other engines, and are much more powerful and capable of a greater speed. One of these engines will haul a train which it is now required to run as a double-header. One of the arches at the round house had to be torn out to admit of the engine being run in. She is guaranteed to hand twelve or fourteen passenger coaches at 60 miles an hour, weighs from 65 to 70 tons, and is nearly twice the size of an ordinary engine. She took out a train to-day as a tester.




