The premium on gold at Buenos Ayres has advanced to 75 per cent.
All the sugar refineries at Bristol, England, will be closed shortly.
There are rumors that the United States Senate may reject the Sumner treaty.
The Anti-Slavery Conference has been postponed till after the French elections.
The suffering in the mining district at Braidwood, Ill., is awful in the extreme.
The re-hearing of the electric light patent case was concluded at Ottawa Wednesday.
A band of incendiaries are burning churches and school houses in Vanand county, Texas.
The comet recently discovered at Kick Observatory, California, is visible at Sydney, N.S.W.
The mother of the late Dr. Nelms, of Victoria University, died in Simece Wednesday, at the age of 93.
The enforcement of the Alien Labor Law has been withdrawn by the local authorities at Alexandria Bay.
The Portuguese Government has contracted with an English engineer for the completion of the Delagoa railway.
The co-operative brewery at Buffalo has been bought by an English syndicate.
Mr. Loring, the new American Minister to Portugal, Thursday presented his credentials to the king.
Ex-King Milan has disavowed any intention of interfering with the existing regime in Serbia.
The latest statistics make the number of lives lost in the Johnstown, Pa., district at about 6,000.
Through ingenious devices many persons at Johnstown are receiving far more than their proper share of the relief fund.
The wife of Sheriff George McVey, jr., of Fayette county, W. Va., was thrown from her buggy on Wednesday and killed.
A number of persons in New York state that they saw Hogan, the aeronaut at Coney Island on Saturday and Sunday.
Harvesting has commenced in Northern Minnesota. The wheat has not headed so thickly as usual, but the quality is reported good.
Postmaster-General Wanamaker is in favor of moving the New York post-office uptown, to somewhere in the neighborhood of Union square.
The report that Mrs. Geron, a lady missionary, was to be executed in Corea for preaching Christianity is officially contradicted.
After church Tuesday night at Trenton, La., two negroes, Joe Cook and Sol Dorsey, engaged in a scuffle. They drew pistols and fired, and both were killed.
Mr. G. F. Marter has been renominated for the Local House by the Muskoka Conservatives.
An English syndicate is making strong efforts to secure control of the steel works in the Pittsburgh district.
Mrs. Scott Siddons has rented a cottage at the Thousand Islands, and will spend her summer vacation there.
The German South-west African Co. is said to be negotiating for the sale of all its African possessions to an English syndicate.
Last week 192,216 tons of freight were transported through the Erie canal against 144,462 tons the same week last year.

Shares in the North American S. I. Company were sold to the London Stock Exchange Tuesday at 17s. 6d. premium.

The carpenters of Kansas City are on strike for nine-hour day. Union and non-union men joined in the movement.

Geo. Lewis, a negro living near Belden, Texas, was lynched the other night for poisoning the well of William Shaw.

Mrs. Miranda Sawyer, wife of Bishop Sawyer, who had been adjudged insane, hung herself on Tuesday at St. Louis.

The Pittsburg appraisers have decided to admit English wool at ten cents a pound, instead of from 30 to 60 cents as heretofore.

A heavy mud slide on the Northern Pacific railroad, which occurred near Miles City, Mont., on Saturday, covered 500 feet of the track.

Rev. G. J. Bishop, of Toronto, was married at Uxbridge Tuesday to Florence, daughter of Mr. Edward Moore, of that town.

There are a great many deaths in the Conemaugh valley, largely the result of the severe mental and physical suffering the people have endured.

Mrs. Mary Brady, convicted a few days ago in Jersey City of being a common scold, was Tuesday sentenced to pay a fine of \$25 and costs.

The U.S. consul at Rio Janeiro reports that the Brazilian Parliament is anxious to make a commercial treaty with the States, so as to secure a good market for sugar.

Advices from Africa are that Zint Graff, the African traveller, has arrived at Ibi, on the central branch of the River Benue. He is in good health.

John Rose, one of the most prominent citizens of Powell county, Ky., who is credited with having killed five men, was assassinated on Monday.

Morris Crawford, formerly of Glen Williams, Ont., was attacked by a ruffian in Detroit on Tuesday night and beaten so that he died.

Lord William and Lady Cecil have arrived at Napanee, and will settle up the affairs of their uncle, the late Lord A. P. Cecil, drowned recently.

The remains of George W. Webb, president of the East Northumberland Reform Association, who died on Monday week after a long illness, were interred at Colborne Wednesday. The funeral was largely attended.

Chauncey Kniffen, aged 22, shot himself dead on Tuesday at Lake Mohopac, N.Y., after he had shot three times at his wife, Annie, 18 years of age. The couple quarrelled continually during the four years of their married life. The woman will die.

Maud Taylor, aged 10, stepped from the midnight train at Pembroke on Monday night, thinking the station had been reached, fell thirty feet into the river and was drowned. The engine had stopped at the tank to take water, leaving part of the train on the bridge.

THE NEW RAILWAY.—Mr. Pew stated one day last week that the plans and profiles for the Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo railway, between Welland and Toronto, have at length been completed, the construction fully organized, and that the work would be pushed forthwith and completed by Jan. 1st, 1890, a few months later than at first anticipated, owing to unforeseen delays in perfecting preliminary arrangements. Matters are now in such shape that funds can be procured, and Mr. Pew assured us that the construction company would take charge at once, and begin paying off all debt owing on survey. Mr. Pew says tenders will be asked for the work between Welland and Hamilton in a few days.—Welland Tribune.
