Haldimand Teachers' Convention

COPIED FROM THE SACHEM.

Charles Dana in an address delivered before the Press Association of New York, says: "The intelligence and cultivated taste of any mixed assemblage is most easily gauged by the dress of the ladies present." Even if there be only a modicum of truth in this dictum of the American cynic, the Sachem feels impelled to lift its metaphorical hat, and make a very low obeisance indeed to Inspector Moses, while it compliments him on the association of ladies and gentlemen who occupied the seats of our High School on Wednesday and Thursday of last week. The Sachem does so, because it is fully cognizant of the fact that to Mr. Moses more than to any other single individual is due the honor of raising the public schools of Haldimand to the proud positions they now occupy among the public schools of the Province. By his watchful care, wise counsels and judicious oversight he has raised the standard and improved the system of education, until the schools of our county will compare favorably with those of any county in the Dominion. All this he has accomplished so quietly and unobtrusively, that few, besides the teachers under him, fully appreciate the real worth and ability of the modest, unassuming gentleman, who holds the position of I. P. S. in Haldimand. The Sachem (still with its hat off) turns to the ladies and remarks (with its most courtly bow) that even the crusty editor of the N.Y. Sun, had he been present; must have been more than usually cantankerous to find among them a single dress that did not suit its wearer in cut or color, a single flounce or frill too much, a single ribbon, flower or feather too pronounced for the tout ensemble, or a single cunning little bang out of place. The Sachem believes you to be all good true women with twice the will and ten times the power of clumsy men to "teach the young idea how to shoot" in the direction of the Teacher who says, "Suffer little children to come unto me," which the Sachem takes to be the noblest wisdom, and the grandest aim and end of all education. And the Sachem (still with hat in hand) looks across the heads of the ladies to the gentlemen, and says, "Haldimand is proud of you (albeit you have not so much beauty of feature to spare as the ladies), proud of the work you are doing in her schools, and proud of the results attending that work. You cannot make all your pupils SCHOLARS, but you can teach all to reverence the good and true, you can teach them all to be brave, earnest, upright men and women, loyal to their country and their country's God. You can teach them that the greatest force in social statistics is KINDNESS, that the grandest conquest is SELF CONQUEST, and that the surest path to happiness for themselves is by hearty endeavor to promote the happiness of others. You can teach them that the Bible is the best of textbooks—the only book that can teach them how to conquer Death, the last grim foe, which every son and daughter of Adam must face alone and unaided. All of which the Sachem believes you do teach to the best of your ability. Mr. Inspector, Ladies and Gentlemen! the Final Examination cometh apace. God grant that all of us and our loved ones may pass, and obtain admission to the Great High School, whose Head Master once taught common school on earth at a very poor salary, but is now the King of Glory and Ruler of the Universe." Having said which the Sachem puts on its hat again and resumes business.

Mr. Hindson of Dunnville opened the meeting of the Association on Wednesday by reading the 5th and 6th verses of Proverbs, chap. 3, followed by a most appropriate prayer.

Mr. Sangster of Cayuga was appointed chairman.

Inspector Moses in the course of a few prefatory remarks, intimated his intention of securing an American educationalist to address the association at its next meeting. Should he be successful in getting a live, practical, scholarly Yankee, the teachers of Haldimand will be immensely benefited by his experience and suggestions.

Among the difficulties in school work that provoked a good deal of discussion was IRREGULARITY OF ATTENDANCE, particularly in rural schools. Mr. Moses opined that visiting the homes of the children and making school work interesting were excellent remedies for this wide-spread disease. He remarked that etiquette in the country did not necessitate an invitation to visit, as is the case in towns and cities, and that teachers were always welcome in a farmer's home. (The Sachem is one with Mr. M. on this point, still if a humble member of the Fourth Estate may be permitted to do so we would suggest that the teacher endeavor to ascertain before-

hand the size of the spring pullets and the watch dog at the house to be visited, what day is washing day, and above all the exact location of the old man's corns. Ignorance of such trifles sometimes causes inconvenience to the visitor.)

Mr. Cheswright made a good point when he said that, to win the confidence of boys, the teacher should, when occasion fitted, be a boy himself. He believed that talking with a boy about his future, and pointing out how that future would be influenced by his industry (or lack of it) at school were excellent incentives to regularity of attendance and effective study. Various other devices, such as frequent examinations, exhibitions, recitations, monthly reports and the like were suggested as remedial agencies. During this discussion, and in fact all through the meeting, the ladies were scarcely heard from. Mr. Hindson protested vigorously and even pathetically against their silence. Mr. Street ably seconded Mr. Hindson's efforts, but the dear creatures only smiled a negative, as only women can, and the Principal sighed drearily as he sat down muttering: "When she will, she will, and when she won't she won't."

The time to be devoted to different classes brought out some excellent ideas. The monitor system incurred general condemnation, and it was made very apparent that more teaching ability is required to handle junior pupils than to handle seniors.

In Mr. Moses' remarks on promotion examinations he dwelt very pointedly on the evils arising from unjust promotion of pupils by a teacher when

Conemaugh Disaster.

Eight thousand people were drowned in a flood in Conemaugh Valley, Penn., on Friday night. Lack of space prevents us from giving a full account, but below will be found a few despatches copied from the Globe.

PITTSBURG, June 1.—Trustworthy railway men from Pittsburg, now engaged in recovering bodies of the dead, estimate that not less than 6000 people have perished in Johnstown and the other towns along the Conemaugh River.

Adj't-Gen. Hastings, who is in the vicinity of Johnstown to-night, states the total list of dead in the Conemaugh disaster will not fall below 8,000 and may reach 15,000 persons.

NEW FLORENCE, Pa., June 1.—About 4,000 persons lost their lives in the flood and the property loss will be about \$11,000,000.

SANG HOLLOW, Pa., June 1, 5 p.m.—The reports of the number drowned vary with each person asked for an estimate of the loss of life. One man said that he overheard Supt. Pitcairn say that the number would not fall far short of 5,000. Others put it at 3,000, down as low as 800, and anywhere between two to two figures mentioned.

Later—the first reports of the loss of life were entirely too low. It is believed that at least 8,000 persons have perished. Of these 700 or 800 were burned in the fiery furnace at the viaduct. Two thousand coffins have been ordered for bodies already rescued.

Conemaugh is laid low, Cambria City is gone, Johnstown is utterly demolished, and not a house stands in Colville.
