Mr. Street advocated the study of English literature for the intense pleasure to be derived from even a partial acquaintance with it. The man who can commune with sages and poets through their writings has a loftiest enjoyment that earth can afford, from which he may drink at will. Not to every son or daughter of humanity has been given the key wherewith to enter the holiest shrine in the poet's soul, but every nan and woman may-be fitted by properly directed study, and earnest endeavor after true culture to enter the outer temple and worship. Which worship, if it be conducted in the spirit of true reverence, will fit men for the higher worship of the Eternal. ITEMS OF INTEREST IN CONDENSED FORM. The speaker, while strongly opposed to memorizing the gems of poetry for two reasons. First they were the best of companions for any pupil, and secondly they increased the student's vocabulary These results he considered of far more importance than the mere training of the memory. In teaching literature the teacher should endeavor first to cultivate the ability to use English. This can be done by the experienced teacher to a greater extent than is generally supposed. Next he should ground his pupils thoroughly on the principles of composition, paying particular attention to the proper sequense of clauses in complex sentences, for herein lies the great secret of good composition. Terseness should be taught and required in every expression of thought. Grammatical exactness can only be secured by constant and careful explanatory correction. After acquiring facility of composition the pupil may be introduced to literature proper, embracing as it does grammer, logic, rhetoric and philology.
