Spring on the Manitoulin Island.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE RECORD.

How much poetry good and bad has been written on the beauties of spring, yet each succeeding arrival of that welcome visitant is none the less cheering. And we have never seen a more favourable one than the present on the Manitoulin. From the middle of April cattle have been running at large and finding a plentiful living, and I have never seen an earlier seeding or the land in a nicer condition in any part of Ontario.

Our lake is again enlivened with a great variety of water fowl, to which we have become so accustomed that we seldom think of slaughtering them, although with gill net, hook and line we give due attention to the fish which teem beneath the wave.

I was chatting with the Rev. Mr. Schroeder one day in front of my residence when a neighbor lad came to inform me that a large bear was interviewing his father and uncle in a field close to the house. One of my sons and myself were soon away gun in hand, the Rev. gentleman also went with us without a gun, probably to act a peace maker, referee or surgeon as seemed requisite, but master bruin had taken an unceremonious leave before our arrival and as I had failed to take my dog along, with which I might have overhauled him, we had to return hoping for better luck next time. An Indian half-breed has already trapped two this spring near us and there are indications that these impudent freebooters will still be plentiful.

Though happily in the past sickness and death has been such a rare thing on the Island, yet I am sorry to say that in the space of two weeks we have lost three hearty and promising young men. The first was Charles Robinson whose parents live in the village of York, Haldimand County. He came in company of his brother James to his uncle Robert Alexander's place last fall. After working all winter for Mr. Mutchmore of Providence Bay, he went to Little Current to work in one of the mills there, but was taken sick the night of his arrival and despite the best medical aid, died in a few days time. Two other young men went in company to the Current at the same time, Albert Palmer and Wm. Perkins. The former named young man soon after returned with the sorrowful news that Willie Perkins had been drowned while rafting logs. His parents who are our near neighbors have been almost inconsolable to lose the only grown-up son in a large family, who was the main-stay and hope of his hard working father, but alas! No sooner had Albert Palmer returned to his work at the Current than he too was called to pay the debt of nature, stricken down with a malignant fever. Comment on these sad events is needless. I must give a due tribute of praise to the citizens of Little Current, however each of these parties received every attention possible and received a handsome burial free of charge to their friends.

A grand camp meeting is to be held in a bush contiguous to our place, commencing on or before the first of July. A large party of Evangelists from Berlin and Elmwood have arranged to come. There will also doubtless be a large gathering from different parts of the Island. Intending visitors and friends should come in time to take this gathering in.
