AWFUL RESPONSIBILITY.

The Coroner's Inquest in the Matter of the Johnstown Disaster.

THE SOUTH FORK HUNTING AND FISHING CLUB IS CRIMINALLY NEGLIGENT.

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., June 8.—It is rumored that the South Fork hunting and fishing club is a thing of the past. No one admits his membership, and it is doubtful if, outside the cottage owners, one could find more than half a dozen members in the city.

Coroner Hammer, of Westmoreland county, has concluded his inquest. The verdict finds the South Fork hunting and fishing club responsible for the loss of life, because of gross, if not criminal, negligence, and of carelessness in making repairs from time to time.

SOUTH FORK DAM, Pa., June 8.—This community is very much incensed against the South Fork hunting and fishing club. Already some of the villas have been broken into and the furniture demolished. The boats are stolen and reduced to kindling wood.

LONDON, June 8.—The Times, commenting on the Johnstown disaster, and the fire at Seattle, says: "While we may be thankful for immunity from these occasional penalties of material greatness, we cannot forget, and it is satisfying to see that our countrymen have not forgotten, that the Americans are our brethren in sorrows and sufferings which make the whole world kin, are entitled to special and active sympathy from ourselves."

The Chronicle says: "The Johnstown and Seattle disasters would appear to show that the rapidity with which our American cousins manage engineering and building operations is not always conducive to the safety of life property when the elements attack them violently."

PORT JERVIS, N. Y., June 8.—A letter received here from Hoytsville, Pa., states that the village lost eleven lives in the floods and that the village is in ruins.

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., June 8.—Affairs at the stone bridge wreckage pile seem to have resolved themselves into a state of almost hopelessness. At the rate the workmen are proceeding it will be months before the debris is cleared away and the last body found. Sometimes when an extra large dynamite shot is used to blow the wreckage up bits of wood and iron in shapes fearfully suggestive fly directly upward in a solid column 300 feet high only to fall back into almost the same spot to be tugged and pulled at or coaxed to float down an unwilling current that is falling rapidly. The fact is they are not attempting to recover the bodies at the bridge; but as one blast tears yards of stuff into flinders, it is shoved indifferently into the water. Up in the center of the town the debris is piled even higher than at the bridge, but the work is going on fairly well. Horses and wagons can get at the wreck. Some of the foremen say that at the present rate of work throughout the town all the bodies that ever will be recovered will be found within the next ten days.

A report that diphtheria has broken out in a crowded camp in town has caused general alarm. It is said that many cases fever, diphtheria and pneumonia are being concealed from the people here for fear a panic may seize the workers. Disinfectants of all kinds are being freely used by the carload, and the wreckage is being burned at many points.

A trap was laid to-day for a crook undertaker, who was robbing the bodies in the fourth ward morgue. A female body was brought in and before it was dressed for burial a diamond ring was placed upon one of the fingers. The pseudo undertaker was assigned to take charge of the body. He was detected in the act of stealing the jewelry, was arrested and taken to Elensburg.

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., June 8, 10:30 p.m.—Forty-seven bodies have just been discovered in a hole on the site of the Huribut house. They are supposed to be the bodies of the guests.

The number of persons who have so far reported is 20,110. It is believed that within five days all the living in Johnstown and the vicinity will have been accounted for. The registration thus far leaves almost 15,000 to be accounted for. It is not claimed that those who have not registered are dead, for many had left this section before the registration began. It is said that 8,000 people have left this section.

Up to date there have been 1,500 bodies recovered.

A little daughter of James Moore, of Malden township, was shot by her elder sister, who "didn't know it was loaded," the other day, and the little one bled to death. Some of the shot also struck a little brother.

Cloud Burst.

COBOURG AND VICINITY DELUGED BY A WATERSPOUT.

COBOURG, Ont., June 1.—The most terrible rain cloud that in the memory of the oldest inhabitants ever deluged this district visited this town and the townships of Hamilton, Haldimand and Altwick early this morning. Between 2 and 3 o'clock the sound of what many people call a waterspout was heard coming over the lake from a south-easterly direction. When it struck the town the rain descended in great sheets, and in a few minutes small creeks were converted into mighty torrents. The storm cloud passed away north-easterly, leaving behind a track of desolation about ten miles wide.

The worst havoc imaginable was created in the valley of Baltimore Creek, which supplies the chief water power in the riding. An hour after the storm had passed one mill dam after another broke away, and the tide swept down to the lake with irresistible fury. As it neared Cobourg it swept away every yard of the dam at Poe's mill, brushed aside the dam at matting factory, washed out the Grand Trunk Railway embankment north of the woolen factory pond, and broke two or three large holes through the great dam at the woolen mill. Houses were inundated and gardens destroyed as the flood swept on to the lake. In the business part of the town nearly all the cellars on King street were filled, and in a dozen instances the water rose five or six inches above the shop floors. The loss which these merchants have suffered amounts to thousands of dollars. There are only two or three bridges left standing in the municipality, and the town is practically cut off from the outside world. Two or three families were rescued from the upper stories of their houses in boats. It will cost the Grand Trunk Company \$50,000 to repair the break in their embankment. Many farmers are heavy losers. The lake shore is strewn with heaps of debris and wreckage. The total loss to this riding cannot be short of \$500,000.

The fire at Seattle burned out 280 firms and persons, most of whom lose all. Sedgewick and Kingman counties in Kansas have been devastated by a cyclone.

Considerable damage was done by a cyclone in Western Missouri on Saturday.

Edward Hanlan has reached San Francisco on his way to Toronto, where he intends to reside.

The store of S. S. Dickson, at Paekenhams, was burglarized of \$60 early on Saturday morning.

A severe storm passed over Oswego, N. Y., Sunday, doing much damage to crops in the neighborhood.

The thermometer registered 90 in New York Sunday. One death and several prostrations occurred.

News has reached New York that the actual construction of the Nicaragua interoceanic ship canal has been begun.

A Kansas man is in Manitoba looking over the land, and says he and fifty neighbors will remove to the Prairie Province next spring.

A tornado at Danvers, Ill., on Friday opening destroyed a church, blew freight cars from the tracks, ruined a factory and unroofed barns and houses.

The St. James' hotel, at Steven's Point, Wis., with all its contents, has been burned. The clerk, Chas. Oatball, and two of the girls, Maggie Reilly and one known as Nettie, are missing.

Brown's livery stable at Morden, Man., has been burned, together with five other places, entailing a loss of nearly \$30,000. A drunken tramp was arrested, charged with starting the fire.

A G.T.R. brakeman named May, in attempting to get on a moving train in the Barrie yard on Saturday, slipped and fell, inflicting a severe scalp wound and injury to his thigh. The surgeon does not consider the injury serious.
