One of the biggest swindlers of the vear has just been brought to light Western liquor men have been mulcted to the tune of \$300,000 and a bright voung chemist named Comp is now living inluxury far away.

John Archibald Comp came to Chicago fifteen months ago and put up at the Cosmopoliton Hotel. Among his effects were two large trunks and a small refrigerator. He seemed to have plenty of money and it was noticed that several wholes de liquor dealers were among his visitors. Mr. Comp claimed to have discovered a compound which, when mixed with new whiskey, would give the odor, taste and appearance of from four to six year old wine. Under his manipulation the poorest quality of "wet goods" became "smooth," and the entire process was exemplified in the presence of the victim. Mr. Comp wished to establish a stock company with a paid up capital of \$1,000,000. The profits would be enormous. He refused to divulge what the compound he used consisted of. The ingredients were only known to him.

He mamaged to "rope in" many victims, and finally rented an office in the Ætna block at Jackson and Clark streets where, for several weeks, he conducted his business. In the room was the refrigerator referred to. The victim would be given a bottle, told to go out and have it filled with poor quality of monia. wiskey and return. When this had been done, Mr. Comp would pour out destroyed five blocks. 
