Burglary at Springfield.

MESSRS. HEMSTREET & PRICE'S STORE BROKEN INTO AND VALUABLE PROPERTY STOLEN—THE BURGLARS CAUGHT.

Some time during Wednesday night of 1st week, burglars forced an entrance through the windows of Messrs. Hemstreet & Price's store at Springfield and carried off a lot of clothing, shirts, hats, collars, ties, gloves, etc. Some tramps were seen in Springfield on the day previous, and suspicion immediately fastened upon them as the burglars. A description was wired in all directions, and on Saturday they were locked up in Welland, where they had offered a pair of gloves in exchange for drinks at a hotel there. Detective Heenan of the M. C. R., and Constable Huffman, of this town, brought the prisoners from Welland to St. Thomas on Monday of last week, when they were arraigned before P. M. Leonard and remanded. They gave their names as Wm. Burns, Wm. Jones and Wm. Rantoul and claimed to hail from Detroit. Detective Heenan had an interview with Rantoul, who "peached" and admitted that they had committed the Springfield burglary. Part of the stolen goods were found on the man, while hidden in their cell was found a couple of pairs of gloves, shirts, ties, etc.—Aylmer Sun.

WRESTLING WITH HIS CONSCIENCE.—In the year 1873 a Mr. Wilson, who resided in Oshawa, had \$1 in money and a gold watch stolen from him for which he had paid \$150 shortly before. A few days ago he received an express package from the State of Indiana containing his watch and chain, also a letter with a cheque for the money with interest. The letter stated that the writer had been wrestling with his conscience for the last fifteen years, but it had downed him at last.

An Indian named Isaac Powlis, from the reserve near Hagersville, who had been working for a short time for Wm. North, of South Norwich, formerly of Tilsonburg, skipped out on Wednesday of last week, taking with him sundry valuables belonging to his employer, including a dog, an axe, and two horse blankets. Mr. North came to town and had a warrant issued and placed the matter in the hands of Chief Pow, who has notified the officers of the neighboring towns and cities, and the culprit will probably be caught ere he gets far away. He is about 5 feet 6 inches high, low-legged and stoop shouldered, and has a shuffling gait in walking. He wore grey cottonade trousers or overalls, a brown coat and a straw hat, and carried his wardrobe in a bag bearing a blue trade mark stenciled on it with the words "Ogilvie's Augurian" above and below.—Observer, Tilsonburg.

EDITOR RECORD.

DEAR SIR.—As one of the members of the deputation from the Simcoe School Board, which recently visited your town for the purpose of going through your school building, to satisfy ourselves as to the working of the Smead Dowd system of ventilating and warming. Allow me a little space in your columns to say a word or so in regard to our visit. My remarks will not refer particularly to the Smead Dowd apparatus. Of its efficiency, I am well convinced, there can be no two questions. Our subsequent action in deciding to spend \$3,500 in putting it in a building, is at least proof that those members of the Board here, who went to Jarvis, were satisfied with what they saw of it there. My object in writing is particularly to return thanks on behalf of myself and my fellow trustees, to Mr. Allen, the chairman of your board, who met us at the station and did all in his power to facilitate our search after information. Mr. Allen was hospitably and courteous, itself and we are greatly indebted to him for his kindness. Your school building was to all of us a matter of surprised admiration. Without being elaborate, it is handsome, commodious, and substantial. Its furnishings are complete in detail and modern indeed, altogether it gives to one from outside the impression that in matters pertaining to education, Jarvis is abreast of the times, and that its school affairs are in intelligent and progressive hands. Mr. Editor, you and your towns people have reason to be proud of your school building.

The granite monument erected by personal friends of the late President Arthur was unveiled on Saturday.

The Montenegrin government has demanded satisfaction from Turkey for raids on the Albanian frontier.

Dr. Meacham, M.P.P., has been chosen as the Conservative candidate for Lennox for the Ontario Legislature.

The collections at the New St. James street Methodist church in Montreal Sunday amounted to \$3,500.

The June floods have worked disaster to the farmers of Southern Indiana who have crops in the bottom lands.

Private William Ilton, of the 39th Norfolk Battalion, suicided by drowning in the Niagara river Sunday morning.

A peddler named George Lipp has been sentenced to one year in the Central for stealing a set of harness from a farmer in Bertie township.

A brakeman named Lake was killed on the G.T.R. near Prescott on Saturday. He was tightening the brake when the chain slipped and he fell under the cars.
