A Boundary Question.

One of the vexed questions that must be disposed of before the relations subsisting between the United States and Canada can become entirely satisfactory, is that arising from the lack of a definite boundary line never between Alaska and British Columbia. Not only has this boundary line never been laid down but there is very little data to go upon in determining it, for both the original Russian and British claims to this almost Arctic wilderness are of a vague description. The natural features of the country render the survey very difficult, so that both diplomatists and engineers have their work cut out for them. The survey work may cost from a million and a-half to four million dollars, and the cost in money and brain energy of deciding where the surveyors As the value of the area the sovereignty of which can be disputed is doubtful, the expenditure of, say, four millions in deciding what shall be read and what shall be blue on the map of North America is, at least, not urgent. The best way to settle the matter would be for Canada to offer the United States territory to the eastward of Alaska proper in return for the narrow southern of Aliska, which cuts off a large section of British Columbia from the sea. By fixing the new eastern boundary of Alaska upon an easily ascertainable line of longitude and the western boundary of British Columbia at the sea, the expense of surveying a boundary line would be saved to both countries.

The Hamililton Disaste.

VERDICT RENDERED BY THE CORONER'S JURY IN THE MATTER.

HAMILTON, June 10.-Following is the verdict rendered by the Coroner's jury to-night in the late railway disaster near the junction cut, where twenty lives were lost: The jury were of opinion that

others who were passengers on No. 52 east-bound express on Sunday, April 28, 1889, were killed by the accident which occurred to that train at the junction near Hamilton, caused by the of \$3 per share and an extra dividend breaking of the flange of the left leading wheel of engine truck, which break allowed the wheels to leave the track at the switch; and the jury were also of the opinion that the speed at which the train was running had much to do with the cause and extent of the disaster which followed. Your jury are also of the opinion that greater efforts could have been put forth to prevent the almost entire cremation of the unfortunate people who were buried in the wreck. Your jury would recommend from all practical evidence adduced that on a curve with a switch on a down grade that a greater rate of speed than twenty miles an hour is nesday. Seventy persons were killed not consistent with safety; and, further, that fifteen miles an hour would be much safer and much more desirable in the interests of the travelling public at such point, and would likewise recommend that the Government take such action as may be necessary to ensure a full and complete inspection by a competent person in all cases where there has been loss of life through accident before any further than what may be necessary to rescue bodies and property from the wreck. Had this been followed the jury could have come to a verdict with much

more ease and certainty.


