TRIALS OF SPEED.

2.35 race, for trotters and pacers—Purse \$150, 1st 90, 2nd 40, 3rd 20.

Three Minute trot.—For trotters and pacers—Purse \$100, 1st 50; 2nd 30; 3rd \$20.

Green Race—For horses owned in Haldimand and Norfolk, that have never started in a race and other horses the committee deem eligible. Purse \$50, 1st 25; 2nd 15; 3rd 10.
