## Young Man Stabbed at Chatham

WHILE SITTING WITH THE GIRL HE WAS TO MARRY.

CHATHAM, June 20.—A young man named Frank Barr, about 23 years of age, was sitting with his girl on the steps of the Exhibition grounds last night about 9 o'clock when two other young men passed and made some comments. Barr ordered them to move on, when one of the men, Augustus Park, aged 20, stabbed Barr to the heart, killing him almost instantly. Park surrendered himself to the police.

CHATHAM, June 20.—A revolting atrocity, which cannot yet be legally called murder, as the jury have not yet brought in their verdict, but which is happily unexampled in all our town annals, occurred last evening about 9.30. Murders and dis-ordant versions are current. The prisoner cannot be interviewed, but the following are, it is believed, the essential facts of the case, waiving minor details:—

Frank Barr, a painter, aged 23, in company with Pont Taylor, a brother of Thos. Taylor, butcher on the market, and two girls, one of whom, Anne Kaiser, works as a domestic servant for Mr. Thos. Stone a leading merchant in town, were sitting, about the hour of the tragedy, on the bench in front of the grounds of Agricultural Society on Queen Street, or the Gravel road, as it is also called, going south from the Catholic church.

Gus Park, in company with George Yeomans, came up and stood staring at Barr, or "Dutchy," as he was nicknamed, and called him by an opprobrious name.

Barr told him to go away, and he said "I DON'T HAVE TO."  
Anne put her hand on Barr's arm to restrain him from attacking Park, who went away a short distance and then returned, still hurrying epithets at Barr, who then, thoroughly roused, advanced angrily towards him.

Anne tried to stop him, but he swung her round and handed her his hat or coat, she forgets which, owing to the excitement, and the speed of the whole occurrence.

At this stage Pont Taylor, a powerful young man well able to handle Barr, or Park, stepped in between the would-be combatants to separate them.

Then Park took out a long knife and, reaching over Taylor, made a downward blow with fatal effect at Barr, making a four or five inch gash.

STRIKING AND DIVIDING HIS HEART.

From the effects of the terrible wound he died shortly afterwards.

After receiving the blow he threw up his hands, crying out, "I am stabbed."

He was moved by Taylor to an adjoining house, and afterwards by Taylor aided by others, to his mother's home.

The sidewalk was like a butcher's shambles with blood.

Park is in custody. He is the son of a large farmer in this town, and whose brothers, since the departure of their father, continue and have extended the business.

Here it is absolutely necessary, in the interest of justice and in the face of unjust gossip, to deny that these girls were not of good character.

Mr. Stone gives Anne Kaiser the highest name for respectability. She was engaged to be married to Barr.

A jury was empaneled by Dr. Holmes Coroner, consisting of Kenneth Campbell (foreman), J. H. Glassford, W. Pettit, F. Bennett, M. McGarvin, J. W. Bullis, Jas. Milner, Jas. Frederick, J. K. Simmons, Mr. Side and two others, a very respectable and superior jury, composed of storekeepers and other business men.

They viewed the body at the mother's house and found an incised wound four or five inches long, and clots of blood on the shirt.

Some of them speak very strongly as to the mistake made in allowing the autopsy to precede the viewing of the body.

There were three incisions visible in all, one lateral, one transverse, and the four or five inch cut on the left breast.

However morally certain they may be that the two first were due to the two surgeons and that the last named caused the death, they have no legal proof that this oblique cut might not have been made by the doctors in their post-mortem.

The excitement in town may be easily conceived.

Park has secured Mr. M. Wilson as counsel for his defence.

THE VERDICT.

After some consultation the coroner and Lawyers Wilson and Douglas were recalled by the jury, who sought light on technicalities. Then amid deathly silence the foreman gave the following as their verdict:—To the Coroner now inquiring into the death of the late Frank Barr—Your jurors, after hearing all the evidence relative to the death of the deceased Frank Barr, came to his death by the wound caused by a knife at the hands of Gustavus Park.

The largest furniture depot in Europe the Vieux Chene, Paris, has been burned.

The thermometer registered 90 at Winnipeg and Swift Current, N.W.T., Sunday.

Lord Durham and Sir George Chetwynd have not compromised their turf dispute.

A little girl was "hypnotised" and then bitten by a rattlesnake near Denison, Texas.

Six people were drowned by the upsetting of a bateau at Grand Piles, on the St. Maurice.

Fire destroyed a large amount of property in the Town of Vancouver, Washington Territory.

The striking miners and their families at Braidwood, Ill., are starving, and bread riots are feared.

The American barque Brazos was wrecked on the Australian Coast, and part of her crew is missing.

In Chicago the wheat market was irregular on Saturday, closing a shade easier. Corn continues strong.

Mrs. Maybrick's trial will likely take place in London on account of the prejudice against her in Liverpool.

The annual camp of the Royal Templars of Temperance will be held at Oakville, beginning on the 8th of August.

Some of the convicts in the Kingston penitentiary had formed a plot to overpower the guards and escape, but were failed by Warden Lavell's precautions.

By some means yet unknown a quantity of tartar emetic was introduced into lemonade at the West Zorra Farmers' picnic, and a good many of the guests suffered from its effects.

Wm. J. Hilton, a wealthy old miser of Franklin, Ky., burned greenbacks and Government bonds to the amount of \$50,000 to prevent them falling into the hands of his wife.
