Young Man Stabbed at Chatham

WHILE SITTING WITH THE GIRL HE WAS TO MARRY.

CHATHAM, June 20. - A young man named Frank Barr, about 23 years of age, was sitting with his girl on the coroner's jury felt that justice had been steps of the Exhibition grounds list night about 9 o'clock when two other young men passed and mide some comments. Barr ordered them to move on, when one of the men, Augustus Park, aged 20, stabbed Barr to the heart, killing him almost instantly. Park surrendered himself to the police.

CHATHAM, June 20,-A revolting atrocity, which cannot yet be legally called murder, as the jury have not yet brought in their verdict, but which is happily unexampled in all our town annals, occurred last evening about 9.30.

He was moved by Taylor to an adjoining house, and afterwards by Taylor aided by others, to his mother's home. The sidewalk was like a butcher's shambles with blood.
