A Boy Shot Dead.

TILSONBURG, June 20.—Word was received here this afternoon of a fatal shooting committed on Hazen road, Walsingham, about eight o'clock last night, two miles from Langton, by a fourteen-year-old son of John Davis.

Some boys were practising shooting with revolvers, and, being on the road when young Rohrer came along, Davis told him to stand still or he would shoot.

Rohrer kept walking nearer, when Davis took deliberate aim and fired. The shot took effect in the forehead of young Rohrer, and he he lived only half an hour afterwards.

The boys are the sons of respectable farmers, and no cause whatever is assigned for the terrible deed excepting pure deviltry.

An inquest is being held, and it is expected that Davis will be sent to Simcoe to stand his trial at the Fall Assizes.
