## John Scissors.

Great floods are reported in Southern California.

The new U. S. gunboat Yorktown is completed.

The union of St. John and Portland, N. E., was voted on to-day.

The late John Curruthers, of Kingston, left an estate worth \$675,000.

Candler, who shot Mr. J. A. Sheffield in Montreal, has been sentenced for life.

An outbreak of gold fever is reported from the Sweet Grass Hill in Montana.

Strikes of miners are feared in the coal fields of Ohio, Pennsylvania, Illinois and Indiana.

A movement is on foot in Hamilton to establish a Young Women's Christian Association.

The strike in the ship building trades at Belfast is spreading. About 1,000 men are now idle.

The Philadelphia baseball team beat the home club at Jacksonville, Fla., Monday, by 2 to 0.

Wm. Floyd, paper hanger and general house painter is now prepared to do work on shortest notice.

The Temperance Committee of the Presbytery of Kingston declared in favor of the Scott Act.

The adjournment of the California Legislature on Sunday was signalized by two prize fights, which nearly all the legislators attended.

A verdict of manslaughter has been returned in the Haffield wife murder case at Winnipeg.

A Washington despatch says J. W. Mason, of West Virginia, is to be Commissioner of Internal Revenue.

It is said that \$15,000 was raised at the Steinway Hall meeting in New York Sunday night for the Parnell fund.

A meeting of shareholders of the South Norfolk railway Monday, at Simcoe, resolved to consolidate the road with the Georgian Bay division.

Mr. Payseur, a grocer and disiller living in North Carolina, discovered his wife and one of his clerks in a compromising position on Saturday night and shot and killed both of them.

The American pilgrims were received by the Pope Tuesday, in Rome. In reply to their address his Holiness eulogized American institutions, and concluded by granting special favors to the priests and blessing the lay delegates.

Ex-Premier Cleveland celebrated his 52nd birthday Monday by starting on a trip to Havana, in company with ex-Secretaries Bayard and Vils and ex-P. M. General Dickinson. Mrs. Cleveland remained at home.

Since Nov. 1 three Canadians have been murdered in Chicago. A day or two before the Presidential election a well dressed rowdy employed in the post-office killed Frank Day. A few weeks ago Maud McLell in met her death at the hands of a jealous lover. On Feb. 23, Druggist C. F. Clarke fell a victim to an unknown assassin. In each case death was instantaneous. Judging the future by the past the murderers are likely to go free. In 1888 there were fifty deliberate murders in Chicago. One of the murderers was hanged, thirteen are in prison, and thirty-six escaped punishment.

No. 1 express on the main line of the Northern Division of the Grand Trunk, due at Stratford at 5.30 a.m. met with a serious mishap about a mile and a half west of Lucan on Monday morning.

Owing to the breaking of a wheel, two first-class cars crowded with passengers were thrown down an eighteen-foot embankment, one of the cars rolling over on its way down and the other going down end first. No one was seriously injured, and only ten were hurt altogether, the most of them belonging to the Baird Dramatic Company. The first car was badly smashed. The conductor had pulled the bell rope and got the train almost stopped before the cars went down. The remainder of the train remained on the track and the sleeping passengers in the Pullman were not even awakened.

At the last annual Convention of the Sunday School Association, of Haldimand, the following resolution was passed: Resolved, that this convention, recognizing the importance and duty of the proper observance of the Lord's Day, cannot but lament the evil effects of SABBATH PARADES of any kind, especially at the afternoon Sabbath School hour. SABBATH LABOR, whether employed by corporations or private individuals. SABBATH SOCIAL VISITING AND PLEASURE-SEEKING IN GENERAL, and call upon Christians everywhere, and especially upon Sabbath School workers, to do all that lies in their power to oppose these evils and zealously to guard the sanctity of the Sabbath.

ST. THOMAS, March 11.—An order has been issued to reduce expenses 10 per cent, in all departments of the Michigan Central Railway and is being enforced on this division. The services of 50 section men have been dispensed with and 30 or 40 men in the car shops have been laid off. A number of operators have been laid off, and in many cases the agents are obliged to perform the duties.

ST. CATHARINES, Ont., March 16.—News was brought to the city last night from Niagara that there had been a general row among the United States troops stationed at Youngtown, N. Y., across the river from Niagara. It is reported that during the winter there has been a bitter and uncompromising feeling between the men and officers. The men complained that they were treated worse than dogs, and that their complaints were regarded with contempt. As a result numerous desertions occurred, the skeddaddlers making Hamilton their headquarters, and on Thursday seven of the soldiers made a break for Canada, and got there. The discovery caused a great row. The sergeants and other subordinate officers were censured, and recriminations followed until the fort was in open mutiny. Bayonets, sticks and axes were freely used, and during the melee three of the rioters were stabbed with bayonets, one of whom will not recover. The gates of the fort were closed and outsiders forbidden admission. The escaped soldiers, some of whom are sporting round this city, say they are not disloyal to their country, and are preparing a lengthy document to Gen. Meigs, inspector of the United States forces, regarding their grievances.

[Three of the deserters arrived in Hamilton on Friday. They complain bitterly about the treatment they received at the hands of the officers. Last summer a number of soldiers deserted this same fort.—Ed.]—Spectator.
